

## FOREIGN NEWS.

## FRANCE.

The Philadelphia Press, in noticing the rupture between the Emperor and the Prince Napoleon, remarks:

Prince Napoleon is tabooed for having asserted: 1. That Napoleon I. respected the Monroe doctrine, which Napoleon III. has violated by his invasion of Mexico, where he has overthrown the republic and established a pseudo-empire, with a nominee of his own as its nominal head. 2. That the Pope may be and ought to be head of the Catholic Church, without territory to govern as a temporal sovereign. 3. That freedom of speech and liberty of the press, to the necessity of which Napoleon I. became a convert, after he returned from Elba, are the natural rights of all men in a free country, and that as Napoleon III. does not recognize such rights, France is not free. This, and no more, is the liberalism in Prince Napoleon's oration at Ajaccio, which has annoyed the Empress, angered the Emperor, perplexed the newspapers, provoked certain European potentates, pleased England, and we venture to say, awakened a strong antagonism throughout general society in France against the absolutism of Napoleon III., who is believed by few in that country to have one drop of Bonaparte blood in his veins.

The resignation by Prince Napoleon of the Vice Presidency of the Council and the Presidency of the Exhibition Commission, is accepted.

The Empress has issued a decree declaring all the warnings given to the French journals null and void.

## AUSTRIA.

In the lower house, Keichsrath, Minister of Finance, in a speech on the Budget, said: "The deficiency would disappear in 1864, by the reduction of the military expenditures. But, in the meantime, a loan of fifty-three million florins must be raised to cover the present deficiency, and unless a sale of the crown lands is effected, another loan of forty-five millions will be necessary. The Emperor signed the decree at Perth, suppressing military tribunals for the trial of offences committed by civilians in Hungary."

## CHINA.

Shanghai, May 7.—The American Ministers at Peking and Japan are returning home. The cause is not stated.

**DISAPPEARANCE OF A HOUSE.**—One of the most extraordinary accidents that has been recorded for many years past, took place last week at Prince's Town, near the town of Tredegar, South Wales. A boy was passing along the road, when, as he was looking at a cottage inhabited by a man named Evan Jenkins and his family, he thought that he observed a movement of part of the masonry. On watching it more narrowly, he was satisfied that the framework of the window was sinking, and being apprehensive that the foundation of the structure was giving way, he ran to the door and alarmed the inmates, who were seated round the table at breakfast. By this time the floor began to shake, and the terrified persons immediately ran into the road, and had scarcely done so, when the house began to sink through the ground and in a very short time was entirely out of sight, leaving the site upon which it had stood an open chasm filled within some yards of the road with earth and stones which had fallen in from the sides. It would seem that the ground on which the cottage was raised stood over a disused colliery, and the earth must have first given way at a depth of fully a hundred feet below the surface. The whole of their furniture, and, indeed, every thing contained in their humble dwelling, was carried into the chasm beneath. — [Liverpool Mercury.]
