Come in From Yerington, Nevada, After an Interesting Inspection Trip.

CLOSED BIG POWER CONTRACT

Truckee Company Will Supply it For Ten Years-Equipment to

After spending a week or more in camp, J. D. Wood, president and Walter C. Orem, secretary and treasurer of the Nevada Douglas Copper company, returned from making an inspection of the property of hat corporation near Yerington, Nevada, this morning. While on the ground they directed the starting of the permanent working tunnel, the mouth of which has been located on the Casting Copper ciaim and were present when the miners broke into the 12-foot body of 15 per cent copper ore, the report of which reached the local offices of the company several days ago. The location of this new find was not definitely stated in the previous report, but Secretary Orem said today that it made its appearance in what is known as the S. S. Tunnel. Mr. Orem made the important an-

nouncement, too, that the company had closed a contract with the Truckee Power & Light company with head-Reno, through which the latter will supply the mines and reduction plants of the Nevada Douglas company with power and light for a period of 19 years, on terms more favorable than the mines of Bingham are supplied by the Teiluride Power company. The Truckee company, Mr. Orem states, will begin the construction of a transmission line immediately and will be prepared to supply power and light within a short time. The officers of the Nevada Douglas

feel that they have gained quite an advantage in closing this contract for the reasan that it will not be necessary now for the company to go to the expense of erecting its own plant and for the further reason that the camp will be supplied with power much sooner than would have been the case had the contract not been entered into. With the matter of power facilities

out of the way the management of the Nevada Douglas company will proceed to immediately provide the mine with extensive equipment as well as with plants for the treatment of ore. This will also mean the building of a branch line of the Southern Pacific to the mine. ON MINING EXCHANGE.

TWIN RIVERS STRIKE.

Tonopah People Interested in New Finds Near Millet.

E. E. Sowell and Fred W. Dulfer, who returned yesterday from a visit to the scene of the new discovery at Twin Rivers, says the Miner of Tonopah, re-port that the surface showing is one of the most remarkable they have ever seen, and that if the jedges maintain their values to depth another great mining district will be added to Neada's rapidly growing list

The new camp is situated on the south fork of Twin Elvers, about 10 miles southwest of Millett and 35 miles porthwest of Manhattan. The original discovery was made two months ago, when a prospector named Roberts, who was grub-staked by Dulfer & Sheldon, uncovered a 20-foot ledge which give assays running from \$15 to \$155 a ton in stiver and lead, lead values ranging from 28 to 50 per cent.

The Frenzel brothers, who have been at work on their claims for the past two months, have opened up a ledge which yields assays running as high as \$ill in silver and lead. Last Saturday they uncovered another leage that shows a width of 8 feet, with neither wall in sight, and the assays indicate average values of \$90 a ton.

W. S. Hill is developing a group of laims on which he has opened up a edge between 4 and 5 feet wide that shows assays of \$80 a ton. John A. Sowell has a 25-foot ledge on his group of claims from which he has

secured assays running as high as \$602. At a depth of 5 feet the shaft shows an verage assay of \$51 in silver. There is an abundance of wood in the immediate vicinity and an inexhaustible supply of water near at hand, the camp being situated close to the point where the Tonopah Exploration company proposes to take its water from Twin Rivers to supply Manhattan and the mill which it is about to erect in the latter camp.

SCARCITY OF MINERS.

California as Well as Utah Camps Are Suffering.

There is a scarcity of skilled miners n most of the camps of California, says correspondent, as many of the men formerly engaged in that occupation that occupation ave gone to San Francisco, igher wages are being obtained in almost all branches of industry. It is not only quartz miners who are scarce but hydraulic and drift miners as well, In the higher mountain counties, such as Plumas, Lassen, Trinity, Eiskiyou, etc., this is now causing some uneasisted to stay the entire winter in the larger properties. Inducements are offered in the best going wages comfortable quarters and "grub by white cooks," but all this falls to bring the requisite number of skilled miners. Reven in the more accessible counties, near tailroad transportation, there is a shortage of men to work in the mines. etc., this is now causing some uneasi-

NEW ENGLAND IS DOING VERY WELL

A Bingham Property That Has Been Brought to Front by Henry M. Adkinson.

SOME RECENT DEVELOPMENTS

Mill is Running and Making Money-Company Controlled in

Henry M. Adkinson, manager of the properties of the New England Gold & Copper company in Bingham is in the city today and says things are moving along in a very satisfactory manner, Recent developments are of a character highly pleasing to him as well as to the shareholders, nearly all of whom are residents of the New England

It has been the policy of the New England company for some time to devote its energy towards the development and equipment of the mine and not so much towards extraction of ore, although the mill is running on one shift every day and is paying the expense of operation.

Mr. Adkinson has made a splendid

record since he took hold of the New England mine. When it was turned ver to him the outlook did not look very encouraging. The property had not been left in an inviting condition; but he buckled into it and laid plans to develon systematically. He opened up a good shot of ore and then induced the owners of the property to put up enough money to build a mill and with it he has been able to keep a little ahead after paying the expenses of operaton. In other words, Mr. Ad-kinsin has made good and Bingham, mining men are willing to concede that he has one of the best "little" mines n the great camp of copper. However, lead is the predominating metal in the New England mine.

BALAKLALA AND BINGHAM.

A Boston Critic Says Nice Things About California and Utah Mines.

In his weekly letter about western copper stocks, George L. Walker of the Boston Commercial has the follewing to say: Balaklala stock, which is

traded in on the curb around \$9 per share, will not receive any portion of the 100,000 shares of treasury stock now being distributed. It seems that rights to its portion of this free stock were assigned some time ago. When this stock is distributed, the company will have 400,000 shares outstanding in addition to \$1,500,000 of bonds. The statement that the company's bonded indebtedness amounted to only \$1,000,000 was an error.

I am told that there is an under-standing among the insiders that there shall be no manipulation in the stock prior to the time that actual production begins. It is anticipated that the smelter will be completed about Jan, 1. The company will need some additional money to complete its smelter, tramway and mine equipment but this will be supplied probably by a further issue of \$500,000 bonds.

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

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
