

OBITUARY.

George Smith Grant, who accidentally shot and killed himself, at Oakley, Cassia County, Idaho, January 13, 1885, was the third son of Jedediah Morgan Grant, and his only child by his wife Sarah Ann Thurston. He was born in Salt Lake City, Utah, April 27, 1855, where he resided until between the age of eight or nine years, when he moved to Mill Creek, where he resided until January 1877. Most of the time while residing in Mill Creek he lived with Brother John Snedaker. On January 1st, 1877, he was married to Matilda L. Morgan, of Mill Creek, by Prest. D. H. Wells. August 26th, 1877, his wife died, and as he could not content himself after the death of his wife he sold his property and moved to Salt Lake, where he resided until April 27, 1879, when he left for England on a mission. During his residence in this city he attended the Deseret University, and lived with President Joseph F. Smith. While he lived at President Smith's, he was an active member of 16th Ward Improvement Association.

Upon his arrival in Liverpool, May, 1879, he was appointed to labor in the London Conference, under the direction of Elder George H. Taylor. In May, 1880, he was called from being a traveling Elder in the London Conference to reside over the Norwich Conference. He was away from home on his mission two years and three months, and was always found to be an honest and faithful laborer for the cause of truth. A few weeks after his return from England he visited Oakley, Cassia County, for the first time, in company with Apostles Lyman and Smith, Brothers Chas. L. Anderson, Alma Hale, Orson Bates, H. J. Grant and some others. He was favorably impressed with the country and decided to make his home there.

January 28th, 1885, he was married to Alfred J. Tolman. The letter published last evening gave an account of his labors in Oakley and an editorial a week ago gave details of his ministry in England, so they are necessarily omitted in this statement.

He was born at East Bergholt, Suffolk, England, Jan. 29, 1813, was baptized into the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints at Wymondham, Norfolk, England, where he labored faithfully for several years as a home missionary under the direction of several conference Presidents. He emigrated to Utah September 14, 1878; was a member of the High Priests quorum and Tabernacle Choir. He was always zealous in the discharge of his duty, and was beloved and respected by all who knew him, and died in full faith of the Gospel, with an assurance of a glorious resurrection with the just.

Funeral services will be held in the 20th ward Assembly Hall, Sunday morning, Jan. 25th, 1885, at 10.30 o'clock a.m. Friends of the deceased are cordially invited to attend. Mill Star please copy.
