

**ANOTHER GOLD FIELD.**—The *British Colonist* says, under date of October 20th: Every year is adding to our knowledge of the extensiveness of our gold fields. Our miners are creeping up the auriferous arteries which drain every portion of this northwestern empire. Slowly the riches of the Columbia, the Thompson, the Fraser, the Stickeen and Nass rivers are becoming unfolded; and now Peace river, whose outlet is on the other side of the Rocky Mountains, is coming in for its share of exploration. Parties of miners are organizing in the upper country for the purpose of mining on the headwaters of that river next spring. Most of them, we believe, do not expect to get farther up this fall than Fort George, where they will remain all winter with their pack animals and a plentiful supply of provisions and tools ready for an early start in the spring.
