PRESIDENT SAVES PEACE CONFERENCE

Stands Between the Warring Countries Insisting the Portsmouth Meeting Shall Not Fail.

HAS THE CONFIDENCE OF BOTH.

The Single Point That Separates the Peacemakers is the Old One of Indemnity.

SOME COMPROMISE MAY BE MADE

If Appeal to the Czar Fails, One May Be Made to the Emperor of Japan.

Portsmouth, N. H., Aug. 24.—The personality of President Roosevelt becomes larger and larger in the crisis. He stands between the warring countries insisting that the peace conference shall not fail. Had not he stepped into the breach, the conference probably would already have gone to pieces. Such hopes as remain that it will end in peace and a treaty, rest upon it.

The strength of the president's position is that he commands the confidence of both sides. He has already accomplished much in using his good offices to impress upon each side the necessity of mutual concession and both sides have already yielded a great deal to his persuasion.

Only a single point separates the two sides. It is the question of indemnity. Mr. Roosevelt's compromise position, which he has formally presented at yesterday's meeting in which he suggested that the indemnity be paid in the form of a loan, has been met with a refusal to accept it.

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RUSSIA STANDS FIRM.

She Will Not Pay Indemnity or Make Cession of Territory.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 24.—The correspondent of Reuters' Telegram company was today authorized by Count Lamsdorf, the foreign minister to state officially and in the most formal manner, that Russia will pay Japan no contribution, direct or indirect, nor will it make any cession of territory whatever.

PRESIDENT AWAITS DEVELOPMENTS.
Oyster Bay, Aug. 24.—President Roosevelt is awaiting developments in the pending negotiations for peace. Beyond his direct appeal to Emperor Nicholas and to the government, he has no other means of influencing the situation.

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COL. ELLETT ON THE WAR PATH.

Licensed at Lack of Attention in A Well New York Restaurant, He Attacks the Waiters.

HE SOON CLEARED THEM OUT.

He Knocked Down Four Policemen, When Reserves Were Called Out and He Was Subdued.

New York, Aug. 24.—Licensed by lack of attention in a well known up-town restaurant last night, a man of athletic build and a man of Col. Tazewell Ellett of Richmond, Va., gave battle to several waiters and caused a stampede of diners to the street. Police who interfered were badly mauled by the colonel and it required the joint efforts of five officers to land him in the station.

Just what started the battle is not known. The excited noise attracted a large crowd around the doors and the police had to force their way in. They found the colonel charging the waiters and knocking them down. He was then taken to the station.

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FRANCE WILL BRING MOROCCO TO TERMS.

Ministry Hold a Meeting and Discuss the Disciplinary Measures To be Taken.

A MILITARY DEMONSTRATION

Will be Made if Satisfaction is Not Given, and French Legation Will Be Withdrawn.

Paris, Aug. 24.—The ministers, under the presidency of Premier Rouvier, held a lengthy session today.

It was principally devoted to a consideration of the disciplinary measures to be taken against Morocco, should the sultan not yield to the demands of the government for redress for the recent arrest of a Franco-Algerian citizen.

An official communication says that a unanimous approval was given to the instructions to be sent to the French minister at Fez, Strone Taillandier, and to the subsequent motion to be taken to compel the sultan to give satisfaction.

The nature of the action is not disclosed, but it is known that it contemplates the military occupation of a Moroccan town near the Algerian frontier, probably Oudjda, owing to its proximity to a large French garrison in Algeria and to its strategic importance as it commands the route to the interior of Morocco and the capital, Fez. The latest of the advances from Fez show that the sultan continues to hold the Algerian prisoner.

The communication does not refer to the peace negotiations, although it is understood that the ministers formally discussed the general prospects of war.

Following the meeting, Premier Rouvier sent instructions to the French minister to demand the immediate release of the prisoner, informing him that a military demonstration would be made in case of a negative response.

Later it was announced that the ministers had decided that in case Morocco refused the French demands, the entire personnel of the French legation would be withdrawn.

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DR. M. H. HARDY IS CALLED HOME.

Late Superintendent of State Mental Hospital Succumbs to Heart Failure.

DEATH SUDDEN, UNEXPECTED.

Had Been Ailing for Some Time, but Was Thought to be on the High Road to Recovery.

Provo, Aug. 24.—Dr. Milton H. Hardy, one of the best educated men in the state and until quite recently medical superintendent of the State Mental Hospital, died last night at his residence in this city, a victim of heart failure.

Dr. Hardy had a severe attack of indigestion and was confined to his bed for several weeks. He recovered sufficiently to be out and was thought to be on the high road to complete convalescence, when early this week he suffered an attack of heart failure from which he never recovered.

He was about 50 years of age and had been in the medical profession for many years. He was a highly respected member of the community.
