Huntington, Emery Co., Nov. 17 .- Oct. 3 and 4 were days of celebration and rejoicing in the family of Thomas Siris Terry, at the Terry ranch, in Wosn-ington county, Utah. Father Terry was 80 years of age Oct. 3, and is hale and hearty. He has three families and is the father of 30 children; he has also 136 grandchildren and 57 great-grand-children, making a total of 223 souls; of this number upwards of 190 met to celebrate his eightleth birthday anni-versary, Oct. 3, 1905. Father Terry is

a pioneer of 1847, and still wears his pioneer badge. At the beginning of the festivities,

which were held upon the bestrates, which were held upon the besultrul lawn in front of T. S. Terry, Jr.'s, house, T. S. Terry, Jr., in behalt of his father's posterity, presented his parent with a beautiful gold watch and a new suit of clothes. The inscription on the inside of the case of the watch read, "S0th anniversary. T. S. Terry, Oct. 3, 1905."

A number of appropriate songs, ada number of appropriate songe, ac-dresses, recitations, etc., were rendered, and an original poem was read, the production of Nora Huntsman, grand-dsughter of the Patriarch. Father Terry then made a touching

response, giving a short sketch of his eventful career, including his conver-sion to the Gospel and his work and travels as a Pioneer. He recounted the favor of the Lord in healing the sick under his administrations, and bore powerful testimony to his children of the divinity of the mission of the Prophet Joseph Smith, which will never be forgotten, and closed by blessing his

GREAT CRESCEUS SOLD. New York, Nov. 22.-Cresceus, the world's champlen trotting stallion, record 2:025, was sold at auction today for \$21,000 to M. W. Savage of Minneapolis. This sale was reparted as the final pass-ing of Cresceus from the race track by those who crowded Madison Square Gar-den. When Cresceus was led into the space reserved for him he was cheered heartily. The bidding was brief P. H. Maguire opened if at \$20,000, and after a short stience Mr. Savage suid \$21,00, and Cresceus was sold at that figure. Baron Gale (2:11%), who won the Ken-tucky Futurity two years ago and for whom \$20,000 was said to have been re-fused after the race, was sold today at \$2,000 to W. L. Elwood of Dekulb. III.
