Since the graduates of American col-leges achieved such noted distinction in 1906 a high spirit of rivalry has ex-isted between them and Japanese-schooled Chinese, and this is supported by the patriotic feeling in Japan, where the number of Chinese students is in-creasing annually.

Congress With Invocation

Defeated by One Vote. STRANGE REASON WAS GIVEN.

Manila, Oct. 13 .- Great Interest is down in the first Philippine congress. which will take place this week, and the arrival of Secy. Taff, which comes at an opportune time in the inauguration of the Philippine home rule. Already the contending political factions are showing great activity and at the caucus recently held the first brush occured over a motion to have the assembly proceedings opened with prayer. This was defeated by one vote, on the broad ground that church and state should be kept dis-

The caucas was attended by is del-egates. The position of the assembly on questions relating to the political future of the Philippines is expected to be determined by Secy. Thift in his address opening the session. This is the view held by Filipinos as well as Americans. The latter are generally in favor of a specific pronouncement on Philippine policy. The course of legislative action will depend mainly on the result of the fight of the Go-mez radicals for continuance of the National party. The Nationalistic, when united, ex-ercise controlling influence, but their internal divisions give the Progressive Independents the balance of power. It is not likely that party spirit will play much part in the assembly's af-fairs, owing to personal differences within the parties. The indications are that Manuel Quescon will be the candidate for speaker. He is believed to be favor-ably regarded at Washington and his election gives assurance that no res-solution for the independence of the Philippines will be considered.
