LOCAL BRIEFS.

To Attend Institute—State Supt. A. C. Nelson and Prof. W. M. Stewart of the university will attend a teachers' conference to be held at Beaver Saturday and make addresses.

Dies of Typhoid—Charles Deverger, who came to this city four weeks ago from St. Louis, died at St. Mark's hospital Wednesday of typhoid fever. He was 27 years old.

Bank Clerks Meet—Tonight—The semi-monthly meeting of the Salt Lake chapter of the American Institute of Banking will be held this evening at the Y. M. C. A.

Postmen to Meet—There will be a meeting of the Utah Postmen's association this evening at the Commercial club. Scoring barred Plymouth Rocks will be the subject of the evening.

Col. Plummer Returns—Colonel Plummer of the First Infantry has returned from an extended trip through the east. This return relieves Major Williams of the command of the guard.

Will Speak Tonight—Arthur Christensen of California, India, will speak at 7 o'clock tonight in the Volunteers of America hall at 19 Commercial street. His subject will be "Life in India." Mrs. John Hamilton will sing.

To Discuss the Election—W. T. Brown is to speak this evening. In Unity hall on "Some lessons from the recent municipal election which it is worth while to learn" before the Civic Forum. The public is invited to attend.

Poles Ready to Come Down—The poles in Third South street west of West Temple have been denuded of their wires and are ready to be taken down as soon as the new trolley wires are strung from the steel standards at the curb.

Light For Mantle—The state engineer's office received an application Wednesday afternoon from the Mantle Light & Power company for 10 second feet of water from Mantle City creek to develop 450 horse power for electric lighting.

Council Meets Tonight—The city council will hold a short session tonight, for the purpose of passing the half monthly payroll for the last half of October for the city employees. The meeting will be followed by the regular committee meetings.

To Enter Their Protest—There will be a public meeting Sunday evening next in Unity hall to express indignation at the execution of Prof. Ferrer, the Spanish educator and alleged revolutionary. The speakers will be the Rev. E. L. Goshen and the Rev. W. T. Brown and Murray King.

To Give Recital in Logan—Miss Mybelle White Clayton will give a piano recital in Nibley hall, one of the Y. M. C. A. college group of buildings, tomorrow evening. Many of her Salt Lake friends are planning to accompany her for the occasion and are anticipating an enjoyable time.

Lambourne Home Begun—A start has been made on the eight-room house for Charles A. Lambourne, which is to be built in F street near Third avenue at a cost of about \$4,500. It will be built of light pressed brick, with mottled brick and grey stone trimmings. The finish will be used inside. George W. Eldredge is the architect.

Building on Capitol Hill—Work has been started on the concrete foundation of a double house which is to be built by W. B. Baxter on Capitol Hill, facing Main street. Each of the houses will contain six rooms, and will have a laundry fitted in the basement. The cost will be about \$4,500. Mr. Baxter will live in one of the houses and rent the other.

Inspector After Flour—State Food Commissioner Willard Hansen gathered up Wednesday afternoon a number of "50 pound" sacks of flour from the various local stores and commission houses, and found they weighed from 46 to 47½ pounds each. They will be weighed from time to time to see how much flour shrinks in storage.

Adult Blind to Entertain—The adult blind will entertain Friday evening to John Lawrence on "A Sailor's Yarn." He is an old sailor and they anticipate a most enjoyable time. Music will be furnished as a feature of the evening entertainment. The social will be given in the workshop north of the Lion House and an invitation is extended to the public to attend.

Telephone Official Resigns—George W. Wooten, assistant secretary of the Bell Telephone company, has resigned to remove to Chicago on account of his wife's health. He will re-engage in the Bell service there after eight years service. Mr. Wooten was presented Wednesday evening with a gold watch and fob by the employees of the general offices.

Water Users Issue Booklet—The Strawberry Valley Water Users' association of Spanish Fork has published a handsomely prepared booklet of 32 pages illustrative of the Strawberry Valley irrigation project, and showing the immense value the water from the Duchesne watershed will prove to the farmers of the Utah valley watershed.

Find Skeleton While Digging—Anthony McGill who, with three other men, was digging a trench for a water pipe at the rear of the Lambert Water company's building at 141 West First South street, Wednesday afternoon discovered a skull and other bones of a skeleton. Nothing could be found in the vicinity which would give any clue as to who the person was who had been buried there.

Elks Select February—The annual excursion of the Salt Lake Elks to Los Angeles will take place Feb. 5, 1910, and from all indications there will be at least 1,000 persons make the trip. These excursions have become very popular. The headquarters were started by Secretary Raybould, and through at times he had to overcome many difficulties he made all of them great successes. The headquarters will be in Los Angeles, but side trips to all points of interest in southern California will be arranged for.

PLANS FOR FOOD SHOW.
Meeting Last Night Indicates Affairs Will be a Great Success.

An enthusiastic meeting of the Retail Merchants' association was held last night in the Boyd Park building, at which plans for the Greater Salt Lake Food and Industrial association's exposition were further discussed. The exposition, which is to open Nov. 23 and close Dec. 1, will be held in the auditorium in Richards street. Preparations are being made for a display of cooking appliances and utensils, as well as food exhibits, which will compare favorably with such exhibits in any of the cities of the east. Demonstrations of various kinds will be given every day by firms who will employ a number of young ladies who understand their business, and the Westinghouse company will also have demonstrators on hand to show the value of electric cooking appliances.

At the meeting last night several manufacturers of the city were guests of the association and speeches were made on the necessity of the retail merchants and manufacturers getting in closer touch with each other. It was announced that practically all the space in the building had been reserved for exhibitors who will include a number of outside food manufacturers as well as local people, numbering in all about 70 firms.

A feature of the display will be the decoration of Richards street leading to the auditorium. In addition to the exhibits there will be good music, free refreshments and beauty and baby shows, all of which is expected to draw a large attendance and interest the public of Salt Lake City in food products and methods of cooking.

At the meeting last night music was furnished by the Butchers and Grocers' quartet, and after the addresses were made the meeting took the form of a smoker.
