The Twentieth Day.

Manitou in carriages immediately on
the arrival of the train.

Entry in the Twentieth Day.

WASHINGTON, 17.—General Pope
telegraphs the War Department this
morning that he arrested Payne and
22 of his followers and asked whether
the gang shall be turned over to the
United States or marshaled to Fort
Worth, Arkansas, for trial. The
Secretary of War will order the de-
livery of Payne and his men to the
marshals for safe custody and
then marched, as some question
arose, to the American Expeditionary
Court of Inquiry. The latter
will be referred to the Attorney
General for his opinion as to the
mode of civil prosecution.

Constantinople, 17.—Wittendorff,
German government counselor at
Coblenz, who came to Constantinople
to assist in carrying out the re-
forms, has returned to Berlin to
attend the meeting of the staff. He
will return with six German staff
officers and officials for ministers of
war and foreign affairs.

assumed a threatening attitude.

SUNDAY SCHOOL JUBILEE.

On Wednesday, the 14th inst., the
Sunday School Jubilee for the south-
ern part of the Sampson State
held in the large bowery in Mantle.

Some twelve or thirteen hundred
children, with their teachers were
congregated and represented the
schools of Mantle, Ephraim, Wales,
Mayfield, Pettyville and Fayette.

State Superintendent John B.
Malbin presided with his great ex-
perience and ability. The dele-
gates were under the super-
vision of Marshal George Bench and
his aids. At 10:30 a.m. a procession
was formed at the Court House,
which headed by the Man Union
Band, perambulated the principal
streets of the city and then the several
schools took up positions in the
bowery and punctually at 11 the
exercises commenced. Everything
was done to make the Jubilee a
success and the children were
well behaved and conducted.

The presence at St. Petersburg, at-
tended by a staff of experts, of Har-
ker, an American, has given rise to
most varied rumors concerning the
introduction of the Gray elevator
system, construction of Siberian
railway and explorations of the coal
and iron districts of Southern Russia.
The band of 1000 men, who are
employed in the enlargement of the
fleet, and it is reasonable to suppose
that Barker, who is backed by a
powerful American syndicate, is
willing to help the government.
Barker very much astonished the
Russians by the scrupulous honesty
with which, under disadvantageous
circumstances, he nullified his former
contract for supplies of coal, and
he has been rewarded here with
similar favor. He was even ad-
mitted to private audience with the
Emperor.

Prince Gunther, of Schwarzburg-
Sondershausen, has abdicated, be-
cause of his sight failing. His eldest
son, Prince Charles, assumed the
government of the principality to
day.

residence from Gastineau.
