Bert-rand discovered in Madagascar a spe-cles of coffee, coffee humblotana, that is free from caffeine, but contains the bitter principle cafamarine. Other spe-cles with little caffeine have been found since, and very recently three new spe-cles have proven to be absolutely free from the alkaloid, though having some bitter substance.
