CONGRESSIONAL.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 11.—The Senate today considered the bill for the revision of the United States statutes, which had already passed Congress, and been vetoed.

Conflicting hopes it would be left over to the next session, but it was a sort of case in regard to allowing a certain class of war claims.

The Chair appointed Hamlin, Faddock and Maxey a conference committee on the post route bill.

The House bill, for the revision of the United States statutes, was amended to require ordinance officers and others having charge of ordnance to make quarterly returns, and the bill was then informally laid aside.

HOUSE.

WASHINGTON, 11.—The military academy bill was passed by amendment. It appropriates \$255,000; \$130,000 less than the estimate, and \$25,000 less than last year. The saving is principally in longevity allowances.

Consent was given for printing the testimony of the Florida election committee.

Willard offered as a substitute for the joint resolution for the appointment of an international arbitration commission an amendment authorizing the president, in the event of the full ratification of silver, should on or before October 1st, agree upon a uniform relation of silver with gold, to appoint three members for such convention, and to propose to such countries as use both gold and silver as a legal standard of value such convention. The bill was postponed till Thursday.

The bill providing remedies for owners of duties on tonnage and imports, passed.

EASTERN.

WASHINGTON, 11.—A petition of San Francisco importers and the Chamber of Commerce for relief from the present tariff on goods of drapery and merchandise is under consideration by Secretary Morrill. He does not think it possible to do so, but he will give the matter his attention.

Nomination.

The President, to-day, nominated Alexander Sharp for paymaster in the army with the rank of major.

Sharp is the president's brother-in-law, and for eight years has been United States marshal in the District of Columbia.

Pardons.

The President, to-day, gave to the sisters of John Henderson, the New Orleans whiskey convict, his pardon.

Railroad Accident.

ALEXANDRIA, Va., 11.—Three passengers were seriously injured, and one slightly hurt, by the dashing of a train on the Washington and Annapolis Railroad, near Kettle Run bridge. The first car was smashed into a thousand pieces. The passengers were mostly invalids en route for Florida.

Libel Suit Closed.

ST. LOUIS, 11.—The libel suit of the Rev. Stuart Robinson against McKee, Fishback and Houser, proprietors of the St. Louis Democrat, closed to-day, defendants confessing judgment in the sum of \$30,000 and agreeing to pay all costs of suit, including attorney's fees of the plaintiff. The original damage asked was \$50,000.

A Passenger Car Jumps a 55-foot Embankment.

RICHMOND, Va., 11.—A passenger car on the Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad, this morning, made a forty-five foot jump down an embankment upon the solid ice with a car full of passengers. Seven were hurt, none fatally.

Failures.

BOSTON, 11.—The suspension of Sargent Bros. and Co. a dry goods house is announced; liabilities \$167,000; assets stated at \$242,000.

David A. Patch, brewer, has suspended; liabilities \$90,000, unsecured, \$35,000 and by real estate. His assets are unknown.

Deaths of the Two Louisiana Governors.

NEW ORLEANS, 11.—In an interview, to-day, Governor Packard stated that he intended to retake the supreme court building, but he would proceed under forms of law, and would not allow a conflict which would remain as a cause of bitterness after the recognition of his government, which even he regarded as certain.

The four senators who left the State House are said to be at Pinchback's residence, to-night, with a guard of the Nicholls police around the house, at their request, to prevent their capture by the sergeant-at-arms, Barrett and Kennedy, who withdrew from the State House, were admitted to the Old-Fellows Hall legislature as members, and shortly after returned to the chamber. Barrett indignantly denied the statement that money had been offered him, and after denouncing the other body in unmeasured terms, said he left because he saw his property was being legislated away from him. Kennedy asserted that the State House legislature had passed a number of bills which were never read or referred to committees.

The Nicholls legislature has adjourned.

The Defunct Bridge Investigation.

ASHTABULA, 11.—James Tomlinson, of Ottawa, Canada, who made the drawings of the fallen bridge, testified that he did so under instructions as bridge builder for the railroad; never approved of the wronged Howe truss over a large span. It makes an unusually heavy bridge, and all strains accumulate on the end bracing. However, he stated that the bridge had the main braces made heavy according to the design. He intended they should be strengthened, but did not remain with the company on account of a difficulty between himself and the State concerning this bridge. The main braces were the only defective part of the bridge; except its unnecessary weight, it was calculated to bear from two to three tons to the lineal foot. His difficulty with Stone was caused by the refusal of Stone to consider a plan for strengthening the main braces.

Gov. Williams and the Militia.

The Times Cincinnati special says it is reported on good authority that Governor Williams has announced his intention of putting the State militia of Indiana at once on an official war footing. Officers are to be appointed to traverse the State, enlist men and muster volunteers into the legion. The force will be organized, armed and put in a condition to be called into active service at a moment's warning. The Governor has the power of appointing all the field officers above Major, and is himself Commander-in-chief. The laws of the State provide that the legion can be called into active service when war, invasion, insurrection, or public danger, or when any one of these is threatened or anticipated. This measure, it is said, will promptly will put Gov. Williams in command of a formidable force. Whether it has any special significance at the present juncture is a question about which there may be a difference of opinion.

Death of Another Actor.

NEW YORK, 11.—Lucille Western, daughter of Henry H. Western, (yn), to-night, of consumption of the lungs, the result of a cold contracted during her recent engagement in Philadelphia.

The Bennett-My Affair.

The Tribune's Philadelphia special says there is little doubt that Bennett married Miss May, and both sailed for Europe in the German steamer *Urania* from Philadelphia, to-day. The despatch further says that it is reported on good authority that May was wounded in the leg, and forced an artery severed. Modification of leg, and amputation had been performed.

Appointment of the Interior.

CHICAGO, 11.—The Interior-Office Washington special says Steward Dr. Woodford was appointed, to-day, district attorney at New York. The appointment caused some surprise.

A Member of Senator Morton named E. K. Hart, is said to have been held here to-day. He was employed in the Postoffice Department, and was a popular fellow. No cause assigned.

WESTERN.

An Embroider Convicted.

SAN FRANCISCO, 11.—Ex-Pension Agent H. C. Bennett was, to-day, convicted in the United States Circuit Court of embezzlement. Counsel gave notice that they demand a new trial.

Decision Reversed.

In the case of Granico, who killed Madden, editor of the *Argus*, the Supreme Court has reversed the decision of the lower court and released Granico.

FOREIGN.

TURKEY.

The Proposals.

CONSTANTINOPLE, 11.—The *Phare de Bosphore* says war must be considered imminent so long as the powers confine themselves to endeavoring to force the Porte to discuss their conditions without taking the Turkish proposals into consideration.

Herr Busch, the newly appointed Secretary of Legation in Berlin, will take charge of the German Embassy on the departure of Baron von Werder, had an interview with Minister Pashas to-day, and urged him to yield to the demands of the powers.

Going to Inspect the Fortifications.

The *Standard's* dispatch from Belgrade, dated Thursday, says General Nikitine goes to Gladova and Negotin, to inspect the fortifications.

FRANCE.

An Outrage by Bash-Bazouks.

PARIS, 11.—A dispatch from Bucharest reports that a band of Bash-Bazouks crossed the Danube on Monday night, plundered a Roumanian outpost, and killed two Roumanian soldiers. There is great excitement in Roumania at the outrage.

GREAT BRITAIN.

London, 11.—A Belgrade dispatch to the *Times* says it is stated that the Turks attacked Ralatz, in Negotin district, on Tuesday. Two hundred men were killed and wounded in the action. The checked Negotin but were repulsed.

The Turks have burned two villages in Morava Valley. It is possible that General Nikitine has gone to the scene of action at Negotin.

The *Times* correspondent adds that the Turks perhaps intend to violate Servian soil, seize the south bank of the Danube, opposite Zverin, and fortify the crossing-place on both sides of the Ibar before the Russians or Roumanians can participate them. The Russian Consul engaged a steamboat to convey the remaining Russian troops down the Danube.

CAUSE OF THE MAY-BENNETT ESPIONAGE.—A gentleman of high standing in society, and acquainted with all the parties, said to a reporter of the *Graphic* that the report that Miss May was in her bridal robes on Wednesday morning was a mistake. "She was in her wedding dress," he said, "and she was in her bridal robes on Christmas morning and on the evening before. Mr. Bennett was so delighted at the approach of the event that he lost his head, and in this circumstance he was the truth and point of the affair. The Mays think he did this act on purpose to break off the engagement, but he did not. He simply broke away from his wife, and she, who had been arranged, he poked off up-town the evening before the event was to come off without any overcoat or overhose, and walked all the way to Stretton's and back again, making, as we all know, a remarkable journey, that did not fatigue him so much as the Irishman said, because of the south as he was in the habit of the whole affair, and it ended in the engagement being broken off more than a week ago."
