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SPRINKLING TAX REDUCED.

The street sprinkling question then came up in the report of Recorder

of frontage in the district was 325,418 feet, and the total frontage represented by the protestants was 65,000 feet, or less than one-fifth of the total amount. They therefore recommended that the necessary orders to complete the carrying out of the intention be made.

Mr. Pendleton-I move that we re consider the sprinkling question. not wish to obstruct any needed improvement, or proper enterprise, but I cannot and will not vote for the adoption of any such harsh and unjust measure. The poor should not be made to bear the burdens of the rich. voted in favor of the matter once but I have changed my mind.

Mr. James-I understand that signatures are now being obtained to raise money to defeat the proposition by car-

rying it into the courts.

City Attorney Hall, when asked as to the legality of the proposition, replied: I am unable to give a definite opinion on the subject without further consideration. I would suggest that the matter lay over for one week.

Mr. Cohn-I am opposed to a reconsideration of the matter and thus defeat what we have already done. move that the tax be reduced from ten

to eight cents per front foot.

Mr. Hall—I seconded the motion to reconsider for the reason that more than 600 property owners presented a petition to this Council asking that the tax be not levied. They are certainly entitled to a little consideration at our It is unjust to tax the outlying streets at the same pro-portion as those which are cen-trally located. I am in favor of a compromise, by the creation of two districts. Increase the rate, on the streets centrally located, to fifteen cents per foot, and reduce it on the outlying streets to five cents per toot. Elght cents will defray the expense of sprinkling for seven months. Then why assess the sum of ten cents per front foot? It will be criminal on the part of this council to knowingly levy a tax twenty-five per cent. in advance of what is needed.

Mr. James-I move that the matter be referred back to the committee with instructions to report at the next regular meeting of the Council. I do

regular meeting of the Council. I do not believe in my rich neighbors enjoying luxuries at my expense.

Mr. Lynn—The actual cost of sprinkling is seven cents and eight mills per front foot. I move the rate of tax be reduced from ten to seven cents per front foot, the eight mills to be taken out of the general fund of the city.

city.
This motion carried, Karrick, Penibroke and Anderson voting against it.

TO RESURVEY THE CITY.

Mr. Hall-A short time ago the city engineer was ordered to resurvey the city. That gentleman has been too busy to attend to the matter. I move that he be allowed to engage such additional assistance as is necessary to perform the work without further delay. Carried.
