The stock market was very active today. The number of stocks traded amounted to 15, which is greater than for some time past. The number of shares sold was 27,900, which brought \$18,402.92.

Four Aces led out this morning with 100 shares at 2 1/2, which was immediately followed by an advance to 4, at which price 2,500 shares changed hands. Geyser-Marion disposed of 1,000 shares at 5 1/4, which shows a steady decline.

Lower Mammoth with two more assessments coming, sold up to 54, while Northern Light sold down to 8 1/2 and closed weaker.

Petro was very active at improved prices, caused by recent ore shipments. The stock sold up to 42, but weakened slightly before the call closed.

Showers Con. was handed out at 19 1/2 to 15, while South Swansea let go 200 at \$1.29. Sacramento brought 18 1/2. Sunbeam was released at 2 and Tesora sold at 42.

Yankee Con. was a heavy trader at from 14 1/2 to 15 1/2.

MERCUR MINE'S BIG SHIPMENT.

More Than Half a Ton of Gold Cyanides Reported.

THE NEW PASS GOLD MINE.

The Superior Vein Proving Up Well—Assessments for Lower Mammoth—Dividends Announced.

The Mercur mine reported today at the sampling rooms of the Con. Kansas City Smelter and Refinery company with over half a ton of gold cyanides. The gross weight was given at 1,050 pounds. This is the largest semi-monthly shipment that the Mercur has ever made, or that has been made by any Utah mine excepting the Golden Gate. The value of the shipment will run close to \$20,000, and talks louder than words of the successful work done by the mill last month when an average of 530 tons of ore were run through daily.

The directors of the company will meet in a few days and announce the quarterly dividend of \$50,000.

DIVIDENDS DECLARED.

The Daily-West Posts 25 Cents a Share and Ontario Pays \$45,000.

Word was received at the local offices of the Ontario Mining company yesterday evening that the quarterly dividend of 25 cents a share, or \$45,000 has been declared payable on the 29th inst. The books close on the 16th inst. This makes \$90,000 paid by this old producer this year.

The directors of the Daily West also met late in the afternoon and declared the monthly dividend of 25 cents a share, or \$37,500 payable on April 16th, the books to close on the 16th.

The shareholders of the Centennial Eureka received their first quarterly dividend of \$100,000 today, which makes the dividends already paid and declared this month from Utah mines amount to \$227,000.

THE LOWER MAMMOTH.

Simon Bamberger is Pleased With His Inspection of the Property.

After a stay of several days in Tintic, arranging for the installation of the new machinery for the Lower Mammoth, Simon Bamberger reached town last evening. Col. Wall visited the property with Mr. Bamberger and was very favorably impressed with its appearance. Sinking on the shaft is still being pushed and nothing will be positively known of the Lower Mammoth's value until the drift from the shaft cuts the vein of the 700 level. Mr. Bamberger says that two assessments of 5 cents a share each will shortly be levied. This will liquidate the debts of the company excepting the bonded indebtedness. A statement of the company's condition is promised on Saturday next.

ARRIVES FROM NEBRASKA.

John Heinrich of the Mercur Company May Make His Home Here.

Vice President John Heinrich, of the Mercur Mining Company, reached the city this morning from Fremont, Nebraska. Mr. Heinrich has sold all his possessions in that State excepting a tract of 3,200 acres of land which he and John Dern own, and which has been rented to a cattle company for \$3,500 a year, cash rent. Mr. Heinrich does not yet know that he will make his home in Utah, but he has brought his family along and they are registered at the Manitou. They will at least remain here until Mr. Dern comes back from Europe and probably make Utah their permanent home.

Mr. Heinrich reports plenty of rains in Nebraska and the present outlook for crops is said to be excellent, much better than for several years past.

REPORTS NOW CONFIRMED.

New President and Treasurer of the Butte and Boston have been Elected.

A New York dispatch, today announces that the directors of the Butte and Boston Consolidated Copper Mining company elected H.H. Rogers president and William G. Rockefeller treasurer. This, it is said, confirms the long continued reports that Amalgamated copper capitalists had secured large interests in the Butte and Boston, and also strengthens the opinion that the latter company will eventually be merged in the Amalgamated Copper company.

SHOWS BIG PROFITS.

Report of Sloss Iron and Steel Co. Discloses Net Gain of \$338,914.

New York, April 5.—The annual report of the Sloss Iron and Steel Co., which is now owned by the Sloss-Sheffield Iron and Steel company, shows earnings for the year ending January 30th, 1900, of \$802,667, which, after deducting \$463,753 for interest, taxes, depreciation and renewal fund, leaves \$338,914 net profits. Out of this a dividend of 1 1/2 per cent was declared in March. Practically all of this dividend goes to the Sloss-Sheffield company, as the latter now owns all but thirty shares of the 50,000 shares of the capital stock of the Sloss Iron and Steel company.

In addition to the depreciation charge above noted, the Sloss Iron and Steel company writes off for depreciation about 25 cents per ton on its iron output and about 3 cents per ton on its coal, so that the amount allowed for depreciation is really much larger than the above item would indicate.

The profits of 1899 were made on an average selling price of iron at \$11.19 per ton at Birmingham, whereas the average price now is about \$17. The profit on coal now is about 50 per cent greater than it was last year.

A PROMISING DISTRICT.

W. R. Hearst Reported to have been Impressed with Shaw Mountain.

The Boston Statesman has the following to say of the Shaw Mountain mining district which it is believed will prove one of the richest districts in Idaho.

When the late W. R. Hearst was here some years ago he desired to secure possession of a group of properties on that mountain. He had looked over a number of districts, but it is said that the Shaw Mountain properties were the only ones he wished to buy. It was his opinion that the district would prove very rich, the forma-

tion and the ore deposits commending themselves to trained judgment. Under the development taking place there, the judgment of the great miner seems likely to be justified. While it may be too early to make a positive prediction respecting the future of the district, it is still true that the developments that have occurred are such as to warrant the highest anticipations respecting the mines there.

The War Eagle Consolidated Mining company has been engaged in developing a group of properties in the district. It is running a main tunnel that will cut the ledge at a depth of 870 feet. This has been driven 780 feet and has not yet reached the ledge.

While work on the tunnel has been in progress, the company has been prospecting in the upper works of some of the claims with very satisfactory results.

On the Paymaster there was a tunnel 130 feet long cutting the ledge at a depth of some 20 feet. At the point of intersection with the tunnel the vein was barren. The company drove west on the ledge and at 47 feet from the tunnel found ore. The ore came in in three streaks, each from four to six inches wide. These streaks were followed 135 feet where they merged into a solid body of ore 2 1/2 feet wide.

The ore carries large quantities of galena. It all averages high in gold. The values shown in the face since the three streaks united have been from \$30 to \$125 in gold and lead, the ore carrying from 15 to 22 per cent of the latter metal. About the same values are understood to have been shown by the streaks all the way in.

Another discovery, that seems fully as important, has been made in the Rising Sun. On that property a tunnel had been run years ago some 330 feet. The ledge was cut in a barren place and the tunnel was driven 60 feet beyond. When the War Eagle company took hold the vein was located in the tunnel and drifting begun. After driving 60 feet, ore was encountered. It soon showed 12 inches from which average samples returned a value of \$80. The ore body has been widening as the work has progressed and is now 2 1/2 feet thick. Moreover, the lead ore that is characteristic of the Paymaster is coming in, and it seems probable that the ore body will eventually be found
