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# **FOR THE FAIR.**

The D. A. & M. Society Preparing for the October Exhibition.

**SALT LAKE CITY, June 4, 1888.**  
**Editor Deseret News:**  
 The Deseret Agricultural and Manufacturing Society was incorporated in the year 1860, by an act of the Governor and Legislative Assembly. It is devoted to the promotion of the industrial arts and the development of the resources of the Territory of Utah. It has given fifteen exhibitions since its organization, and purposes giving another one early in the month of October of this year. Its president and board of directors are elected by the Legislative Assembly, and have hitherto labored earnestly without compensation for the advancement of the material interests of the Territory, and the present board are prepared and expect to continue to so labor in the future. At the close of each of the past exhibitions, the expenses have nearly equalled the receipts; but no surplus has ever accumulated in the treasury, and the society is, therefore, without funds. Nevertheless, it is going ahead with its work, and will offer

**SEVERAL THOUSAND DOLLARS**  
 in premiums for the best exhibits of some products of all kinds at the forthcoming fair. The Legislature, at its last session, appropriated \$20,000 to expend under the direction of the society in the erection of permanent exhibition buildings, but not a cent has been received. It is now used to defray the expenses of the present exhibition. It is to the "gate receipts" for the exhibition, the society must look for means to meet the expenses of its present undertaking.

At the last fair, held in 1881, very substantial assistance was rendered the society by various public-spirited citizens in the offer and payment of special premiums for the best exhibits of stated articles, there having been no less than fifty of such special premiums awarded, and not less than \$1000 in value disbursed to the successful competitors.

**AS AN INCENTIVE**  
 to the emulation of the quite worthy example set by those citizens seven years ago, the secretary of the society was directed, at a recent meeting of the board, to request the local newspapers to publish a list of the special premiums offered at that time, and in the hope that you will appreciate the intentions of the board to acquire in its methods, I enclose the list. If you can lend the society and its objects any encouragement in any other way, it will be most cheerfully acknowledged.
