

DEF JUSTICE SOUGHT REBATE

Judge Marshall of Wisconsin Supreme Court Wanted Commission Paid to Him.

THE FACTS CREATE SCANDAL.

Desired to Pay Premium Into Bank And Receive Usual Agent's Fee Back.

Milwaukee, Wis., July 20.—In the proceedings before the committee of the Wisconsin legislature engaged in investigating life insurance conditions in this state, State Manager M. G. Albright of the Union Central Life Insurance company of Cincinnati yesterday introduced correspondence showing that a supreme court official asked that the life agent's commission for collection of premiums on his (the supreme court official's) policy be paid to him. The letters were written by Chief Justice Roger D. Marshall, Justice Marshall late this afternoon.

JUDGE MARSHALL'S LETTER.

The original correspondence was produced by Mr. Albright today. The letter soliciting the commission for collection is as follows: "State of Wisconsin, Supreme Court, Madison, Wis., October 5, 1905. Union Central Life Insurance company, Cincinnati, O.—Gentlemen: I hold policy No. 222,099 in your company on which there falls due on the 15th day of this month the annual premium of \$571.49. I am not advised as to whether I will be obliged to remit to the principal office. Not knowing that you have any in this city and supposing that if you have such agent he has no claims upon you for a percentage for the collection of my premium, I suggest that you send my receipt to the First National bank of Madison, Wis., with a draft attached for the \$571.49 and instructions to deliver the receipt upon payment of the draft on or before the due date of the premium, and that in such case you permit the bank to take the usual agent's commission to pay the same to me. My policy came from an agent entirely outside of my circle of business acquaintances. I see no reason, myself, why I cannot be permitted to make the payment in the manner suggested, but if there are reasons, of course you will write me suggesting where to send the money. AGENT ALBRIGHT'S LETTER.

The above letter from Judge Marshall was referred by the home office of the insurance company to State Manager Albright of Wisconsin, who in turn wrote to his superior officer as follows: "Milwaukee, Wis., October 6, 1905. E. P. Marshall, Secretary of the Union Central Life Insurance company, Cincinnati, O. Dear Sir:—I am today in receipt of yours of the 5th, enclosing a letter from a Judge of the supreme court of Wisconsin, Hon. R. D. Marshall, asking that you grant him a rebate upon his renewal premium. When a judge of the supreme court of this state makes an appeal for a rebate and does it direct to the home office, it is not time that there be some elevation in the moral conscience of the people in high places before we can hope for much change for the better among the rank and file on the rebate question? "This gives you an idea of some of the difficulties we are obliged to contend with in this state. Respectfully yours, "J. G. ALBRIGHT, "State Manager."

Thursday," said Judge R. D. Marshall over the long distance telephone from his farm in Kibbourn late this afternoon.

"I wrote, as the letters will show, that the company had no local agent in Madison, that I did not know where to send the money for the premium, and submitted the general office of the company the propriety of allowing me to pay the premium into the bank and receive the usual agent's collection fee back, suggesting that they so direct the bank if it seemed proper to them.

"They evidently did not deem it proper and I sent the money in full. That is all there is to it. I defy any one to read into my letter any request for a rebate or allowance other than the usual collection fee allowed agents who handle premium renewals.

"I submitted the question to the company whether or not it would be proper to allow me such a fee in the absence of the authorized agent of the company in the vicinity. It is as plain as the noonday sun and no other meanings can be placed upon any sentence in either of my letters. I wrote for information and as soon as I got it I returned it and remitted my premium in full.

"I added that, in my opinion, the company would do well to appoint agents at other places than Milwaukee, with the idea that it would tend to convenience in collections.

"That is all there is to the matter." The disclosures were the subject of conversation very generally today. Impeachment proceedings were hinted at in some quarters, but the members of the insurance investigation committee scoffed at any such proposition.

"The very worst construction that can be placed on the incident, said the chief of the investigation committee, is that the justice attempted to find a way in which the law might be evaded, and suggest it to the agent. There is absolutely nothing upon which any criminal action can be taken.

The legislative committee this afternoon wrote a letter to Mr. Albright directing him to submit to the committee its next meeting the original correspondence, which, of course, contains the substance of the letter. The committee will meet again on July 21.

STRIKERS MUST RESUME WORK.

Oakland, July 20.—Gov. Van Dyke has issued an order that all striking workmen in the city must resume work by July 21 without fail, otherwise they will be sent to jail by administrative order, and every attempt to prolong strikes will be met with the force of arms. The strikers are incensed by the order, which it is feared, may provoke an outbreak.

Commercial Union, Palatine and Alliance Ins. Co.'s for S. F. Fire Losses.

REST ON EARTHQUAKE CLAUSE

General Manager of Companies Says It Renders Them Immune From Loss.

San Francisco, July 20.—The Bulletin today prints a story to the effect that the Commercial Union, Palatine and Alliance Insurance companies have commenced to pay their San Francisco fire losses on the basis of 75 cents on the dollar. According to policyholders who have been besieging the local offices of the three companies for weeks past, they were told they would have to await the decision of the home offices before a payment could be commenced, but that full settlements would probably be made.

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Oakland, Cal., July 20.—Manager Mullius of the Commercial Union, Alliance and Palatine Insurance companies, this afternoon denied that there is any truth in the rumor that these companies contemplate the payment of San Francisco fire claims held against them on a basis of 75 cents on the dollar. He says that the earthquake clauses in the policies render them immune from loss, and that they will not be regarded.

BIDS FOR PANAMA BONDS ARE OPENED.

Washington, July 20.—Bids were opened at the treasury department late today for the \$30,000,000 ten-thirty Panama canal bonds under Secy. Shaw's circular of July 2, and although no awards will be made until tomorrow or later, it is evident that the entire issue has been subscribed for at an average of 103.94 to 103.95. Secy. Shaw and other officials of the treasury department expressed themselves highly pleased and entirely satisfied with the success obtained.

The total number and amounts of bids made will not be ascertained until tomorrow, but it is apparent that the whole issue has been subscribed for several times. The largest and best single offer was that of Fisk & Robinson of New York, who made six bids of \$5,000,000 each, at an average of 103.85. Smaller bids at higher prices, however, were also obtained.

The secretary having stated that the bonds will be numbered serially beginning with the highest bid, one offer was made at 125 for \$1,000, thus securing to the bidder bond No. 1. An examination of the best bids show that offers of 104 1/8 were made at \$1,100,000; 103 1/8 at \$1,141,700; and 104 1/4 at \$1,141,700. A bid of 104 1/4 is the lowest at which any of the bonds can be awarded. Included in the bids are: First National bank of Cheyenne, \$150,000, at 104; A. S. Pratt & Son, for Yorkston National bank, \$141,700, at 104; First National bank of Sioux City, Ia., \$50,000 at 103 1/2.

OREGON LAND FRAUDS.

Government Expects to Convict Atty. Hope and Commissioner Nichell.

Portland, July 20.—Another link was forged by the government today in its chain of circumstances by which it expects to fix conviction upon Martin G. Hope, city attorney of Medford, and Charles Nichell, formerly United States commissioner, of conspiracy to suborn perjury. Today Henry W. Miller, the confessed arch-conspirator, finished his story and left the witness stand.

ST. PETERSBURG BOURSE ON VERGE OF A PANIC.

St. Petersburg, July 20.—The bourse was on the verge of panic today. In spite of some efforts to support the market, Imperial 4 1/2 fell 1/4 point to 72 1/2, the lowest point touched since the October rising. Imperial 4 1/2 closed at 84 1/2.

THAT INTERVENTION STORY.

St. Petersburg, July 20.—The Russia today explained that its satisfaction regarding the possibility of Austria-German intervention in Russia in the event of a revolution was not official but was based on articles on the subject published in the foreign press.

RUSSIAN BARON MURDERED.

Riga, July 20.—Baron Kaminski, a wealthy and well-known resident near Volmar, was killed today by unknown men while inspecting his fields. He is the second Baron Kaminski, which has fallen a victim to robbers this year.

DAIRY PEOPLE ADJOURN.

Hartford, Conn., July 20.—The convention of the dairier commissioners of states was adjourned this afternoon. It was decided to form the body of the Association of State and National Dairies and Food Departments. E. W. Harko of Wyoming was chosen vice president.

JEWELRY ROBBERY ARRESTS.

New York, July 20.—Two arrests have been made by the police in connection with the robbery of \$50,000 worth of jewelry from Mrs. Halsey Corwin, which was reported to the authorities on Wednesday last.

Many wealthy Mexicans will hold stock and take active part in the direction of the new bank. James Walker, formerly manager of the Bank of London and Mexico, will be manager.

YOUNG WOMAN MISSING.

Belchertown, Mass., July 20.—Search is being made for the body of Miss Wisconsin Mabel Goodell, 22 years old, who disappeared two weeks ago. It is believed now the young woman was murdered.

JAPAN WILL BUY RAILROADS.

Tokio, July 20.—The Japanese government has decided to purchase six railways by Dec. 1, paying for them \$15,000,000 in 5 per cent bonds, redeemable in five years. It is believed that the market will not be disturbed by the transaction.

GOV. GUILD A CANDIDATE.

Boston, July 20.—The Republican state convention will be held here Oct. 8. It is understood that Gov. Guild will be a candidate for renomination.

"MARCHER" McAFEE DEAD.

Rockford, Ill., July 20.—Dr. W. D. McAfee known in G. A. R. circles in the United States as a leading marcher at national encampments, died tonight after a lingering illness.

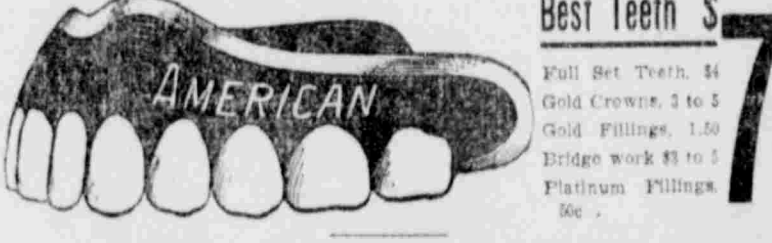

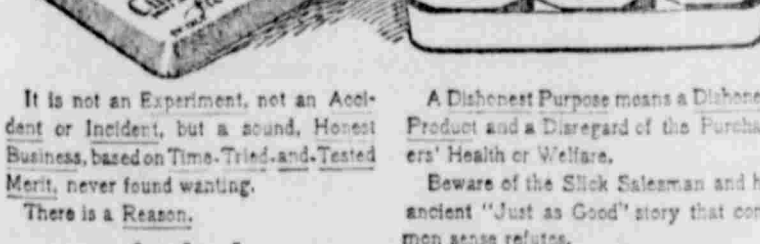
