Judge Marshall of Wisconsin Supreme Court Wanted Commission Paid to Him.

THE FACTS CREATE SCANDAL.

Desired to Pay Premium Into Bank And Receive Usual Agent's Fee Back.

Milwaukee, Wis., July 20 .- In the proceedings before the committee of the Wisconsin legislature engaged in investigating life insurance conditions in this state, State Manager M. G. Albright of the Union Central Life Insurance company of Cincinnati yesterday introduced correspondence showing that a supreme court official asked that the life agent's commission for collection of premiums on his (the supreme court's official's) policy be paid The letters were written Justice Roujet D. Marshall. Jus-Marshall late this afternoon youched for the authenticity of the corndence. The justice, however, said he thought there was nothing irregular in any of the letters.

JUDGE MARSHALL'S LETTER. The original correspondence was proluced by Mr. Albright late today. The letter soliciting the commission for

lection is as follows: "State of Wisconsin, Supreme Court, Wis., October 1, 1902: Union Central Life Insurance company, Cincinnati, O.—Gentlemen: I hold policy No. 222,009 in your company on which there falls due on the 18th day of this month the annual premium of \$671.40. I not abvised as to whether I will be chized to remit to the principal office, Not knowing that you have any in this and supposing that if you have such agent he has no claims upon you for a percentage for the collection of my premium, I suggest that you send my receipt to the First National bank of n. Wis., with a draft attached for \$671.40 and instructions to deliver receipt upon payment of the draft n or before the due date of the premiam, and that in such case you perit the bank to take the usual agent's mmission to pay the same to me. My policy came from an agent entirely tside of my circle of business ac quaintances. I see no reason, myself, why I cannot be permitted to make the payment in the manner suggested, but there are reasons, of course you will write me suggesting where to send the money. AGENT ALBRIGHT'S LETTER.

The above letter from Judge Marshall was referred by the home office of the insurance company to State Manager Albright of Wisconsin, who in turn Wrote to his superior officer as follows: 'Milwaukee, Wis., October 6, 1902: E. Marshall, Secretary of the Union Central Life Insurance company, Cin-cinnati, O. Dear Sir-I am today in reclipt of yours of the 3rd, inclosing a letter from a judge of the supreme court nconsin, Hon R. D. Marshall, asking that you grant him a rebate upon his renewal premium. When a judge of the supreme court of this state makes an appeal for a rebate and does it firect to the home office, is it not time that there be some elevation in the moral conscience of the people in high places before we can hope for much change for the better among the rank and file on the rebate question?

This gives you an idea of some of the fliculties we are obliged to contend with in this state. Respectfully yours.

REST ON EARTHQUAKE CLAUSE

Fire Losses.

General Manager of Companies Says It Renders Them Immune

From Loss.

San Francisco, July 20 .- The Bulletin teday prints a story to the effect that the Commercial Union, Palatine and Alliance Insurance companies have commenced to pay their San Francisco fire losses on the basis of 75 cents on the dollar. According to policyholders who have been besleging the local offices of the three companies for weeks past, they were told they would have to await the decision of the home offices before a payment could be communed, but that full settlements would probably be made. Finally it was announced that agents from London were on their way here with plenary power to effect a settle-

The representatives of the companies arrived Saturday and after making an investigation announced that there was no doubt as to the validity of the carthquake clause which is embodied carthquake chause which is embodied in their policies, and that if they concluded the fire was, as a matter of fact the direct or indirect result of the carthquake they would pay nothing. Notices were finally sent to some of the policyholders of the company that their claims would be paid on the basic of 75 cents or the dollar. basis of 75 cents on the dollar.

Oakland, Cal., July 29.-Manager Mullins of the Commercial Union, Alliance and Palatine Insurance comhere is any truth in the rumor that those companies contemplate the pay-ment of San Francisco fire claims held against them on a basis of 75 cents on the dollar. He says that the earthquake clauses in the policies render them immune from loss, and that they will not be disregarded.

BIDS FOR PANAMA BONDS ARE OPENED.

Washington, July 20.-Bids were opened at the treasury department late today for the \$30,000,000 ten-thirty Panama canal bonds under Secy. Shaw's circular of July 2, and although no awards will be made until tomorrow or later, it is evident that the entire issue has been subscribed for at an average of from 103.94 to 103.96 Secv. Shaw and other officials of the treasury department expressed them selves highly pleased and entirely sat-isfied with the figures obtained.

The total number and amounts of bids made will not be ascertained untomorrow, but it is apparent that the whole Issue has been subscribed for several times over. The largest and best single offer was that of Fisk Robinson of New York, who made prices, however, will probably reduce the amount which will likely be award-ed to them to about \$15,000,000. One bid of 106 for the whole issue came Orleans, but on account of conditions named and for other reasons the bid was not considered. Several telegraphic blds were received too late to be

considered, but the prices named were too small to be successful. The secretary having stated that the bonds would be numbered serially be-glinning with the highest bid, one offer war made at 125 for \$1,000, thus se-curing to the bidder bond No. 1. An examination of the best bids show that offers of 104 1-16 aggregated \$1.100.8sc. 103.75 to 104 aggregated \$14.177.000.

A bid of 104.65 is the lowest at which any of the bonds can be awarded. In-cluded in the bids are:

First National bank of Chevenne, \$150,000, at 104; A. S. Pratt & San, for Yankton National bank, \$150,000, at 104; First National bank of Sioux City.
