# JUDGE LOVING IS NOT GUILTY

Jury Freed Him of Charge of Murder On the Gound that He Was "Insane."

HE SHOOK HANDS WITH EACH.

Committee of Jurors Waited on Him. Saying Did Not Believe Daughter Had Suffered Actual Assault.

Houston, Va., June 29 .- After being out 35 minutes, the jury this evening rturned a verdict of "not guilty" in the case of former Judge William G. Loving of Nelson, manager of the Virginia estate of Thomas F. kyan, for the murder of Theodore Estes, son of Sheriff M. K. Estes of Nelson county Judge Loving shot and killed young Estes April 22 at Oak Ridge, following a buggy ride Estes had taken with the judge's daughter, Miss Elizabeth Lov-ing, who told her father that her es-cort had drugged and assaulted her. The jury returned at 4:45, and from that time until the verdict was returned the defendant remained in the same seat he had occupied since the trial began, surrounded by members of his family with the exception of his

of his family with the exception of his daughter.

At 5:39 o'clock a knock was heard on the door of the jury room, and Judge Barksdale cautioned the crowd not to display their emotions when the decision of the jury was announced. The yerdict was read by Foreman B. S. Mc-Graw. Judge Barksdale thanked the jifrors, and declared that he believed the verdict was in accordance with their conscience. After the jury had been excused. Judge Loying, his wife and other relatives shook hands and thanked each juror for the verdict. Tears streamed from the eyes of both the defendant and his wife. Judge Loving was surrounded by many of his friends, though there was no demonstration.

friends, though there was no demonstration.

Foreman McGraw, a merchant and farmer, said that when the jurors retired one of them did not understand all of the instructions of the court, which were read to him. McGraw said he then called for the vote, instructing all who favored the acquittal of the defendant to hold up their right hand. Every hand promptly went up. When asked what the basis of the verdict was, he said 'Insanity.' The stress he said had been brought on by the story told the judge by his daughter. The day was spent in argument, the forenoon session being taken up by counsel for the defense, and the closing speech by the prosecution being made this afternoon by Atty. Bouldin, Artys. Barksdale, Moore and Lee for the defense, spoke practically along the same lines. They pleaded for an acquittal on the grounds that Judge Loving was insane, having lost control of himself upon hearing the story of the ruin of his daughter. They dwelt on the testimony of the experts and the excessive drinking of whisky by the defendant years ago, which, it was claimed, had diseased his brain. The real basis of their argument, however, was the 'unwritten law.''

Commonwealth's Atty. Wood Bouldin made the closing address for for the state, contending that Judge Loving was sane at the time of the killing. The following statement was given out tonight by counsel for Judge Loving.

"Within half an hour after the rendition of the verdict by the jury and the adjournment of court, counsel for Judge Loving were called on by two of the jury, who stated that they had been appointed a committee representing the entire jury to convey to Judge Loving and his wife and daughter the information that while they believed that Miss and his wife and daughter the information that while they believed that Miss Loving's statement on the witness stand of what she had told her father was a true account of what she had communicated to him, yet not for one moment did the jury entertain the opinion that an actual assault had been committed by the deceased upon the young lady, but on the contrary they were fully satisfied that no actual assault had been committed, but that there had been committed, but that there had been an attempted assault. Counsel for Judge Loving, on being interviewed in this connection, said:

"The conclusion of the jury to the effect that a gasault was committed was absolutely correct."

El Paso, Tex., June 39.—Masoa Kambe, a representative of the Japanese government, who, under direct orders of the emperor of Japan has been the last three years touring the world studying and reporting on sociological problems, acrived here from Mexico today. In an interview with the Associated Press, he stated that the influx of Japanese into Mexico was due to the work of Japanese labor supply companies, who were engaged in supplying contract labor for Mexican enterprises; that the Japanese on arrival there found themselves grossly deceived by the companies sending them out and becoming dissatisfied sought homes in the United States and tried to reach Japan via Vancouver. He stated that in his reports to his government he recommended the immediate abolishment of these companies. He stated that he was en route to San Francisco to investigate and report upon the recent troubles there.

He also stated that the educated and enlightened people of his country do not entertain a thought of war with America, whom they recognize as the friend who led them to civilization and whose sympathy encouraged their efforts to make their nation a power. All talk of war with Japan he said was due to either ignorance or desire to make political capital. Mr. Kambe leaves to morrow for San Francisco and expects to reach Japan in August. He is highly educated, and has the confidence of the government.


