## CHINESE STUDENT MUST RETURN.

**Frank Lee Under Arrest for Being in United States Without Legal Right.**

**ATTY. AGEE'S BROTHER SLAIN.**

**Foully Murdered in Oklahoma—Deserted—Arrested—Shells-Stout Nuptials—Marriage Licenses.**

Frank Lee, who came here from China seven years ago as a student, but who is now one of the proprietors of the Silver Parlor restaurant, was arrested yesterday on complaint of J. P. Longley, special agent of the interior department, on the charge of being in the United States without legal right. Lee is 19 years of age and was brought to this country seven years ago by an aunt who resides in Salt Lake. He came on a passport showing that he was a student, and now that he has for some time been engaged in the restaurant business it is claimed that he has no right to remain in this country. The young man is well educated and speaks English fluently. To reporters he claimed that he is still a student and engaged in the restaurant business to raise money with which to pay his way through school. He will be given a preliminary hearing before United States Commissioner Maloney.

### MURDERED IN OKLAHOMA.

Sad news has been received by A. W. Agee, the well known Ogden attorney, who has just learned that his brother, William A. Agee, was murdered at Jones City, Okla., nearly a month ago. The two men who committed the murder were arrested and have confessed. The murdered man was a resident of La Follette, Tenn., but had gone to Oklahoma for the purpose of purchasing some real estate. Details of the affair as furnished Mr. Agee in Ogden are as follows:

At Jones City his brother met a man named Bratcher, a man who formerly resided at La Follette and with whom Mr. Agee was on friendly terms. An old acquaintance was renewed, and Bratcher, when he heard of Agee's business, determined to accompany him to Oklahoma City and sent his wife and family back to the old home in Tennessee. On the way to Oklahoma City the report was circulated that Bratcher was a man who had been in the city by Bratcher and a young man named Sopher that Mr. Agee had left the city and gone into Indian Territory.
