At Jones City his brother met a man named Bratcher, a man who formerly resided at La Folette and with whom Mr. Agee was on friendly terms. An old acquaintance was renewed, and Bratcher, when he heard of Agee's business, determined to accompany him to Oklahoma City and sent his wife and family back to the old home in Tenn-essee, ostensibly on a visit. One day the report was circulated in Jones City by Bratcher and a young man named Sopher that Mr. Agee had left. the city and gone into Indian Territory. A few days later Bratcher and Sopher left Jones City, and it was noticed that the latter rode Agee's horse, but at that time the circumstance aroused no suspicion.
