

REDUCED TO STARVATION. Men in Yukon Had to Subsist on Dog Meat.

SUFFERINGS WERE INTENSE Were En Route from Dawson to Koyukuk Digging—Were Wandering For Twenty Days.

Seattle, Wash., Feb. 10.—A dispatch to the Post-Intelligencer from Dawson says: Reduced to starvation in the arctic wilderness in the Yukon region, Victor Virgil Lowry and John Bevis of Dawson maintained their lives on dog and porcupine flesh. The story of the suffering and hardship of the men has just reached here by mail.

The two men were en route from Dawson to Oct. 10. They left Dawson after their food became exhausted. They had no gun in desperate straits. They had no gun with which to shoot game, and not a living soul near a place of refuge was known to be within hundreds of miles.

Burchell out of \$17,500 in a stock deal, was today sentenced by Judge Riner to the Colorado penitentiary for 15 months, and was fined \$1,000.

THE MORMON SCARE. Delegate Smith of Arizona Says it is Greatly Exaggerated.

Washington, Feb. 10.—Mr. Smith, delegate from Arizona, secured the floor and replied to some of the statements derogatory to Arizona made in the senate during the statehood debate. He declared that what the "Mormon" scare was a gross exaggeration. He ridiculed the investigation of the senate subcommittee on the matter, which he said, spent two months in investigation and two months in reporting.

GUATEMALA DECLARES WAR. It is Against Salvador and Honduras.

Panama, Feb. 10.—No confirmation has been received here regarding the reported declaration of war by Guatemala against Salvador and Honduras. Guatemala openly sympathizes with Honduras, but it is believed that the president of Guatemala in the senate will favor the government to render Salvador and Honduras as protectors of their respective countries.

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WRANGLE OVER OS LEOPATHY. State Senate Indulges in School Boy Debate.

LOGAN TRIP WAS UP AGAIN. Rapid Discussion of Monday is Duplicated—Unavailing Effort to Include Entire Senate.

The senate yesterday afternoon was pitched and tossed by two vexed questions. The first was whether the osteopathic method of treating sick men and men with broken bones should receive succor from the Legislature and the other was the proposition of going to Logan on Friday to visit the Agricultural college.

When senate bill 1, relating to osteopathy came up on its third reading Senator Lewis moved to strike out the enacting clause. Senator Lawrence said he did not know why such should be done, as he thought the bill was in order in all respects.

Senator Murdock said he favored the bill because he knew there was virtue in the osteopathic method of treatment and he would not vote to deny them the right to practice because of jealousy of those belonging to the old school.

He was asked by Lawrence if he had heard any of the physicians in relation to care for the sick and dead with the osteopathic method. He replied that he had heard that they were doing well and that he would support the measure and that he might as well ask a Baptist to endorse all the practices of the Methodists, as to expect that of the osteopaths.

Senator Barber declared that he would support the measure, partially because he had received many letters from some of his constituents, asking him to work for the passage of the bill. Senator Barnes made a plea for the bill, and took a fling at the doctors, charging them that in their opposition to the bill, they were actuated by the fear that they would lose a few dollars.

A number of questions were asked by Lawrence as to how the examining board was to be held, and on being assured that the passing of the bill would entail no expense whatever upon the state, he subsided and gave some of the others a chance.

THAT LOGAN TRIP. "We will"—"We won't"—is the gist of the rapid debate that took place in the senate yesterday afternoon.

Senator Barnes was quick to move that a committee of two be appointed to meet with the house committee. Senator Lawrence declared he was out of order as the senate had already acted upon the Logan trip and was not prepared to entertain any such proposition as had come from the house.

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Four petitions for the enactment of the Bamberger drunk bill, three for the Bamberger law and one for a county road in Knapp's canyon were received and referred to committees.

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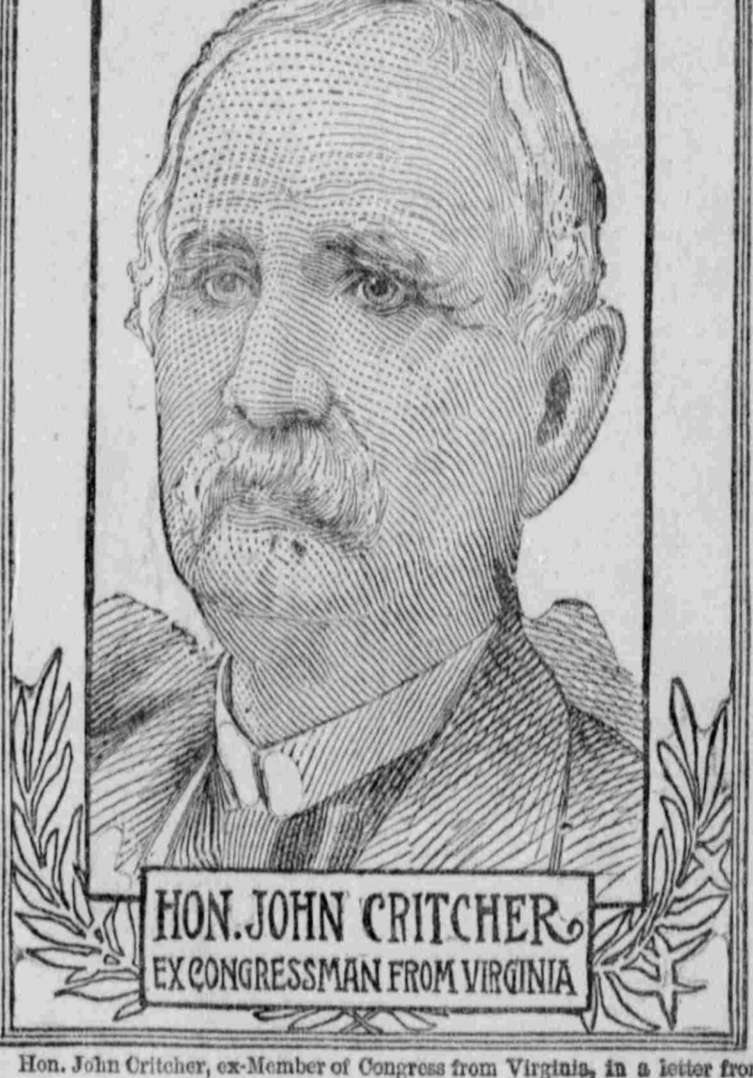
