**Drowning at Lewiston.**  
The sad news came Saturday of the death by drowning of Mrs. Edward Piercy in Snake river at Lewiston on Friday night. It appears that the lady left the house about ten o'clock at night to draw a bucket of water from the river, and that she boarded the ferry boat and was either dragged overboard by the swift current setting against the bucket, or that she slipped, or was seized with an attack of heart disease and fell over. She was soon missed from the house and search instituted immediately, in which half the population of the town en-gaged, but although the river banks were patrolled for miles the body has not been recovered. It was the nightly custom for some members of the family to haul a bucket of water from the river, and Mrs. Piercy had frequently done it, which causes a be-lief that she was suddenly taken sick. A couple of wayfarers promenading the riverside avenue saw something floating down stream about that time, but did not heed it until the news of the accident spread around. Mrs. Piercy was a very popular and sprightly young lady in Lewiston society, and her untimely death in the very prime of life will be deeply deplored by her associates. She left a husband and one child.—*Idaho Free Press.*

**Beaver Bits.**  
Light frosts have characterized the nights of the past week. Bean and potato vines have in many cases been entirely killed. How much we have lost is conjectured. It is to be hoped, however, that the injury is not so serious as last year, when the entire crop was destroyed.  
Mrs. Parker, the lady who some four or five weeks ago, was accidentally thrown out of a wagon and very seriously injured is, thanks to a strong constitution and the skillful and un-remitting attention of Dr. Wenceslas, rapidly nearing convalescence. Out-side of the loss of an ear and a few scars about the head she will fully re-cover from what was one of the closest "calls" a person could have and yet survive.  
It is rumored that several of our most prominent citizens are talking of establishing a first class tannery in Beaver, following which, of course, will come a boot and shoe factory. If rightly managed, a venture of this de-scription can hardly fail to be highly remunerative to the projectors. Many more such enterprises properly inau-gurated and conducted on a strictly business basis would surely sound the clarion note of a genuine boom. Let it come.—*Beaver Union.*  
Central City, Col., June 2.—Andrew Martin was injured by falling rock in the Etna mine and died this morning. He was a married man, aged 35, but leaves no children.  
The work on the Union Depot which was ordered to begin some weeks ago is continuing with unabated activity. Bids for grading the depot grounds will be opened next Monday, after which the contract for this work will be awarded. Work will begin, it is expected, as early as June 16th, and will be prosecuted vigorously, as the buildings are to be completed by Oc-tober of this year. The earth for grading will be hauled from some-where near the Weber River, as it is stipulated that no earth from the depot grounds shall be used in the construction of the grade.—*Ogden Standard.*

**In Cache County.**  
The machinery for the new Deseret Mills has arrived.  
Cache Valley strawberries are now in market at twenty-five cents per quart.  
A miniature cyclone passed over Logan on Saturday, which broke down a number of large shade trees.  
During the wind storm on Saturday, a large tree was blown down near Barber & Thomas' corner; it fell on a buggy belonging to Hyrum, Campbell, of Providence, and smashed it badly.  
John Walkover, of Mendon, while working in the cañon near Deer Lodge, Montana, a short time ago, had the misfortune to break his leg. He was brought to Logan, where his injuries were attended to; he is doing as well as could be expected.  
On the 5th inst., at her residence in this city, Mrs. Eliza C. Goodrich Carlisle, wife of John E. Carlisle of this office, died from the effects of cancer of the womb. Sister Carlisle was a daughter of George A. and Eliza A. Goodrich of Uintah County, Utah. She was born in Salt Lake City Dec-ember 26, 1866. She received a good common school education and studied a year at the Deseret University, giving considerable attention to the study of the rudiments of music, after which she taught school in Morgan County. She was united in marriage to Mr. Carlisle October 15, 1888. She was an earnest believer in the great latter-day work, and exhibited remarkable faith and patience during long and severe affliction. The funeral will take place at the Tabernacle at 2 o'clock on Thursday.—*Logan Journal, June 6.*

**FIFTIETH CONGRESS.**  
**SENATE.**  
WASHINGTON, June 6.—After the reading of the journal the Senate proceeded to executive business. When the doors were opened a message from the President was read vetoing a pension bill.  
All the pension bills on the calendar were passed. Among them were bills increasing the pensions for the widows of Major-General Thomas K. Smith to \$75, Major-General Heintzelman to \$100 and Brigadier-General Schimmelfennig to \$50, and giving a pension of \$50 a month to the widow of Com-modore Truxton.  
The Senate bill appropriating \$125,000 for public buildings at Salt Lake passed.

**HOUSE.**  
WASHINGTON, June 6.—The Senate bill providing for an additional associate justice of the supreme court of Utah passed with an amendment authorizing the government to assign the justice to temporary duty in the busiest judicial districts.  
The House then went into committee of the whole on the tariff bill.
