After missing him once or twice, they succeeded in planting three buckshot in his face, when they took to their heels. The victim of their sport will lose an eye.

A Minnesota gardener has tried the Paris green and salt remedy for potato bugs, and says it is effective. The remedy is compounded by taking two parts of Paris green to twenty parts of ash. A common meal sieve was used in putting it upon the plants. Twenty-two pounds is sufficient for one acre of potatoes.

Annie Campbell of Glengarry, Scotland, has arrived at the great age of 128 years, and is as active and diligent in her duties as many a woman at sixty, having frequently, during the past season, milked as many as twelve cows daily. For fifty years she has lived as a servant in the family of John Murray. During her life she has never yet had occasion to consult a doctor or take a drop of medicine, which last is a good thing not to take. She is a kindly person and very hospitable.

George Hunnewell, an old man who is in the Charlestown state prison, in Massachusetts, under a life sentence for arson, one day last week had the first glimpse of the world without which has gladdened his eyes for twenty-five years. He asked the warden to let him go up into the cupola and look out; the favor was granted, and long and silently he explored with a field glass his old home, Cambridge, and other places, grown very unfamiliar through the changes of the quarter-century. "It is all changed," was his only comment.

A pamphlet has been issued in Germany, entitled "The Earth to Receive a Second Moon, at a Less Distance than the Present One." The author asserts that the zodiacal light is a ring of gas surrounding the earth, and but a few thousand miles from it; that the said gaseous ring is no longer burning, but slowly cooling off, invisible while the sun is below the horizon, of different density, interrupted by the shadow of the earth, and depending in height and duration upon the sun's distance from it. Just as the rings of Saturn, having become cold, are the precursors of moons, so with the so-called Zodiac. The new moon, being comparatively close to the earth, will cause many partial and total eclipses. The author thinks that the catastrophe of the bursting of the ring may be consummated in our time or that of our children.

At a late meeting of the Royal Geographical Society, in London, a letter was read from M. Lamont, the French Arctic explorer, written the day of his departure on a voyage to the north, which he has fitted out at his own expense. His proposed route is far to the east of Spitzbergen, and around the eastern end of the ice to Gillies Land, and along the western coast of this land. It is his purpose to force a passage through the pack ice two hundred miles further than any previous explorer has penetrated, and to reach, if possible, the lofty barrier of perpetual ice which, he maintains, surrounds the polar sea.

Few persons are aware of the various results which have been consequent upon the introduction into extensive use of letter envelopes. Tons of paper and barrels of mucilage are used every month in the manufacture of the different kinds of envelopes. In New York four firms are extensively engaged in the business, and many others to some extent in it in a small way. The number of envelopes turned out weekly is not far from four millions. The gum used is a preparation of starch called dextrine, the value of which for sealing and stiffening purposes was accidentally discovered in England some time since. During the conflagration of a large flour warehouse, a cotton spinner worked at carrying water and rolling out the partially charred flour. In the morning he found his clothes irremediably stiffened and glued together.

On investigation, he ascertained that the scorched flour would form, with water, a glutinous matter much more adhesive than any known gum. Subsequent experiments revealed the fact that this preparation was better than gum arabic for stiffening cotton goods, and the discoverer kept his secret and made money out of the manufacture of "British gum" for cotton dresses. But his success was his ruin; he became a profligate, his secret was discovered, and dextrine came into notice. It is now used for all purposes where a cheap mucilage is required. For dressing cotton goods, for preparing the backs of postage stamps, the edges of envelopes, manufacturers' labels, etc., it is found to be unrivalled. It has nearly ruined the gum arabic trade, as well as that in sealing wax and wafers.
