FINISH NEW ROAD LAST OF NEXT WEEK

Begin Hauling Material and Erecting Buildings at New Smelter by End of This Month.

It was announced at the offices of the International Smelting & Refining company this morning that the Tooele Valley railroad will be finished into the smelter site in Pine canyon by May 20, and the hauling of material into the site will be going at a rapid pace by the last of the month. The excavating for the various buildings at the smelter site is now being carried on with steam shovels and the grade for the various spurs to the proposed buildings is being laid. As soon as material is brought in it will be a matter of but a few days before all the spur tracks about the smelter will be laid. As soon as the spur is finished into the site, the old machinery from the Highland Boy smelter will be carried in and the buildings erected. By the last of the menth, buildings will be going on at a rapid rate.

It is not probable that the really lively work in putting up the steel frames for the big smelter plant will be going at full blast before July. By that time the big work will be moving and the plant from then on will be whipped smelter site is now being carried on

time the big work will be moving and the plant from then on will be whipped into shape as fast as men and motive power can make it advance.

The company already has all its wa-ter mains in. A 16-inch pipe brings it from up in the canyon, and the flow is

believed to be sufficient for the plant throughout each year.

PIOCHE KING STRIKE RICH. Ore Found in Shaft Gives Values That Approach Sensational.

y Field Agent George E. Huir of his division from Commissioner Dennett, of the general land office, Washngton, stating that applications for survey for dry farm lands will be received and acted upon by the government from all citizens who are engaged in bona fide acts of settle-ment, such as élearing the land, etc., though they may not be living on the land.
