BORTIVE REFORT OF J. T. ROCKFORD

Without saying a word to the foreman or the other printers present, he went up to the foreman's deak, pulled off his coat and vest and laid them down. He then deitherately walked out of the

The application of cold water stanched the blood, and a wet cloth was left en the naked breast. He was asked in the wanted in the editorial rooms, and replied that he wanted to go in there and shoot himself up for the deed, and cursed his stupidity in using his left hand when he should have used his right. Asked if he felt pain at all, he replied in the negative, but could not raise his right arm.
