FUNERAL SERVICE OF CHURCH LEADER

Friends of the Late Elder Geo. Teasdale Gather to Honor His Memory.

MANY TRIBUTES OF RESPECT.

His Was Quiet Soul and He Always Stood for Gentleness and Peace Among His Fellows.

The remains of the late Elder George Teasdale of the quorum of the apostles were laid to rest in the city cemetery vesterday afternoon, after impressive uneral services at Assembly hall, The ouse was almost filled with old friends of the deceased who came together to pay their last respects to one of the nost beloved leaders of the Church. Numerous floral offerings were placed upon the casket, while potted plants and palms decorated the speaker's

and palms decorated the speaker's stand.

There were present, Presidents Joseph F. Smith and Anthon H. Lund, Elders John Henry Smith, Heber J. Grant, Rudger Clawson, Reed Smoot, Hyrum Smith, George F. Richards, Orson F. Whitney, of the quorum of the twelve: Seymour B. Young, B. H. Roberts, Rulon S. Wells, Joseph Mc-Murrin, of the presidents of seventies, Patriarch John Smith, Frank Y. Taylor, president of the Granite stake, and Bishop John M. Whittaker of Sugar House ward, where Elder Teasdale resided. The pallbearers were from the quorum to which Elder Teasdale belonged, and consisted of Elders George F. Richards, Orson F, Whitney, Heber J. Grant, Rudger Clawson, Hyrum M. Smith, Beed Smoot and John Henry Smith.

Smith.

At the services, Bishop Whittaker of Sugar House ward was the first speaker. He said in the passing of Apostle Teasdale, earth had lost one of her gentle spirits. The prominent characteristics of the deceased were humbity, sincerity and meekness of heart. He valued the priesthood above all else upon this earth, and his desire always was to spread the spirit of love and peace among men.

ELDER JOHN HENRY SMITH.

Elder John Henry Smith of the guorum of the twelve, said the gospel first found Elder Teasdale in England, and he would fain have remained in his native land all his life, shad he never heard and embraced the truth. never heard and embraced the truth "Elder Teasdale was a spiritually minded man." said Apostle Smith, and his devotion to the cause he espoused, and his abiding faith in it were beyond all question. None of his brentren more intensely loved the truth and none were more ready to perform the duties assigned than was he. Elder Teasdale's life was devoted to spreading the gospel, and many there be, did they have the opportunity, would tell of their gratitude for the works and faith of Elder Teasdale. He was always willing to Teasdale. He was always willing to perform his part, and to do right as he saw it, and may his children fol-low the example set them and their lives be as free from guile us was that of their departed father."

ELDER SEYMOUR B. YOUNG. Dr. Seymour B. Young, who attended Elder Teasdale during his last illness, told of the patience and long suffering and sublime faith exhibited by him in the last hours. He had uttered no word of murmuring or complaint, although his sufferings were great. Not long before his death he said to those around him that all was well with him and he had no fear for the future. The speaker read from Section 76 of the Doctrine and Covenants, applying the language descriptive of the reward of the faithscriptive of the reward of the fait the life and works of Elder Teasdale.

ELDER HEBER J. GRANT, Eider Heber J. Grant said that it was difficult to realize that it was nearly 25 years since Elder Teasdale and himself had been ordained to the and himself had been ordained to the apostieship, but with the coming October it would be a quarter of a century since that event took place. Elder Grant paid a tribute to the character and worth of the deceased. "I never knew Elder Teasdale to be angry." said Elder Grant. "I never knew him to make a false step, or to diverge in the slightest degree from the right. He was a power too in the ministry. Many of our best tracts were written by George Teasdale. The Glad Tidings of Great Joy." distributed in the mission fields, was the product in the mission fields, was the product of his pen, also many others. His writings, as were his words, are full of sentiments of love and generosity for his fellow man."

PRESIDENT ANTHON H. LUND.

President Anthon H. Lund was the next speaker. He endorsed every word that had been said, and told of his personal acquaintance with the deceased. "I knew him," said the speaker, "before he was chosen to the apostleship, when he was presiding over the Juab stake. I always feit he was a man of God, who sought to know his father's will and then to carry it out. Elder Tensdale had great faith. I have seen the sick healed under his administration in many cases. Just a short time before his death I visited him, and his testimony to me was that the gospel was true and that right would prevail. He was a man of great spirituality, and his faith in his Redeemer and in the life to come was without shadow PRESIDENT ANTHON H. LUND. the life to come was without shadow of a doubt. Elder Teasdale lived the life of a saint. He was in reality a soldler of the cross, always ready to defend the cause of God."

ELDER RUDGER CLAWSON.

Elder Endger Clawson added his tribute to the worth of the deceased apostie. His had been a life of activity and usefulness; a spirit of willingness, and of humility before God was characteristic of him. He was loved for his nable traits. He was gifted in many respects, and had the spirit of sons, which was exemplified in quorum meetings, where Apostie Teasdale almost invariobly led in singing. Deceased had been active in Sunday school work; his heart went out to the children and his hope for the youth of Israel was strong. His faith was firm and steadfast, and he had no fear for the future of Ziom. "With feelings of sorrow and sadness we part with Elder Teasdale," said Elder Clawson. "He was an inspirational man and spake and acted by inspiration. And while

he was a man of few words he spake as he was noved upon by the Spirit and was, as my memory recalls, hyvariably in the right." The speaker said deceased had come to Utah at the same time as Elder C. W. Penrose, and paid tribute to the labors of both men, whom, he said, had been called as special witnesses to the wordl of the truth of the gospel. Elder Teasdale had consuited with the speaker at the time he first left England, being doubtful if he would be able to follow his profession under the early conditions in Utah. President Smith assured him that those who put their trust in God would never lack for anything, and advised him to make the trip. Elder Teasdale was always full of hope; no doubt ever dimmed his mind and his missionary labors will stand as a monument to him and as a blessing to thousands of human beings who, through him, were brought to a knowledge of the truth. The speaker exhorted the family of the deceased to follow in his steps. "Brother Teasdale has gone from us, but we know that he lives. If we remain faithful we shall enter the same portals he has entered, and we shall see him beyond the vale.
