

SERVICES AT THE TABERNACLE

Elder Chas. W. Penrose Discourses Upon the Resurrection.

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His Was a Literal Resurrection of the Body, and as He Came Forth So All Shall Come Forth.

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Captain of Israel's hosts and Guide, Of all who seek the Lord above.

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That Jesus was crucified and rose again the third day, and that he is now in the Holy Scriptures. His having come upon the earth was generally believed, and his resurrection was plainly set forth in the New Testament. There he has been declared to be his resurrection, who gained nothing by their testimony but opposition, persecution and obloquy. They did not have to bear the cross and die, but Christ was born on what is now celebrated as Christmas day.

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The Apostle Paul, in his epistle to the Corinthians said: "Now if Christ be preached that he rose from the dead, how say some among you that there is no resurrection of the dead? But if there be no resurrection of the dead, then is Christ not risen; and if Christ be not risen, then are we also deceivers and liars. If we are deceivers and liars, how can we have any faith in the Christian world? The Christian world was divided into a great many different sects and denominations, most of which believed in Jesus Christ and his resurrection, but did not believe in the Holy Trinity, the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, but despite this it was difficult for the reasonable mind to comprehend the orthodox idea of Trinity. The Latter-day Saints believe they are one and are distinct and separate persons. Their oneness consists of their unity of mind and spirit, and action and purpose. This was clearly conveyed in the prayer of our Savior when He asked that He and His disciples might be one as He and the Father are one. Men view things from different standpoints, said the speaker, this explaining why they differ, but all would see the truth alike when they realize the true government of the Father.

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Christ came to reveal God to man, altho He was the mediator between God and man. He was brought up as the son of Joseph the carpenter. It became Him as the author of our salvation to pass through all things, sufferings, pains and afflictions as in the Garden of Gethsemane, that He might understand them, thus becoming "a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief." So truly was the prophet's word fulfilled: "He was led as a lamb to the slaughter, and he was not aware of it." The forces have holes and the birds of the air have nests, but the Son of Man hath not where to lay his head. He was honored one day and then despised and finally He was rejected of the Jews and by them put to death between two malefactors, away with Him, cry the cry and the cry was brought to an inglorious end. Through it all He was patient and forbearing and at the last moment He forgave His enemies, crying in the midst of His agony, "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do." He came from above and descended below all things, and in all things was faithful, true and obedient. He said: "He that doth His will shall live by it." He came to do His own will and the will of His Father who sent Him, and His office at all times was "Father, not will, but Thine be done." Elder Penrose concluded at some length along these lines and then pictured the Savior's rising from the tomb, the obedient slave, which is one of the most beautiful scenes in the history of the world.

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J. A. EDSON IN SALT LAKE CITY

Manager of Rio Grande System Arrives from Denver Today.

SAN PEDRO MAN RESIGNS.

Dr. Bracken Severs Connection With Clark Road—Narrow Escape of Excursionists on S. L. & M. & C.

J. A. Edson, manager of the Denver & Rio Grande and Rio Grande Western systems, was in Salt Lake for a few minutes this morning and then went on to No. 5 to Ogden in his private car. He was accompanied by General Superintendent J. H. Young. The party will in all probability return from Ogden late this afternoon and spend the night in Salt Lake. What is asked is that the inspection trip is not at this time forthcoming, but it is believed that among other things the Salina cut-off, the Layton improvements and the extension of the Sanpete valley branch will be thoroughly canvassed by Manager Edson.

Ogden, April 12.—Manager Edson of the Denver & Rio Grande, accompanied by Supt. J. H. Young, spent the day here visiting the yards, shops and freight offices, with which they expressed themselves as highly pleased. When asked as to probable changes Mr. Edson said that none were contemplated, that things were going on in a very satisfactory manner. As to the Salina cut-off, he said that the material is being secured and the construction is being pushed forward. The Rio Grande is continuing to ship the salt to the yards at that point are being enlarged to accommodate the consignments that are coming in daily from the north. Four men are at present engaged in clearing the track in order that more room can be obtained for the new material.

Yard of the Denver & Rio Grande to Salt Lake that gentleman exhibited an unusual amount of interest in Salina and vicinity. Immediately after his departure for Colorado, where he met Geo. J. Gould and discussed the cut-off. It is believed that as soon as something is accomplished in the Salina cut-off, the movements of the Sanpete dirt will once more begin to fly in the Salina cut-off and that the Milford & Beaver project will also be revived. The Richfield Hooper this week also hints at there being something in the wind. It says:

ASPEN TUNNEL BLOCKED.

On the Union Pacific.

Westbound Union Pacific trains are all late today, owing to a landslide which occurred over the east portal of the Aspen tunnel yesterday afternoon. The eastbound passenger train had just passed through when a portion of the big hill behind the tunnel fell in for the distance of 200 feet to a depth of 10 to 15 feet. As a consequence all trains have been going by way of Rockville and Granger for the past 24 hours.

As soon as word of the slide reached Green River a steam shovel and a big gang of men were dispatched to the spot with instructions that the debris would be cleared away by this afternoon. No one was hurt in the slide, which was supposed to have been caused by the wet weather and the fact that the rains passing through the tunnel. The slide occurred near the scene of the avalanche that occurred a year ago and demolished traffic for the time being.

DR. BRACKEN RESIGNS.

Local Construction Agent for San Pedro Steps Out.

Smelting company at Ringham. His place has not been filled.

CANNOT APPEAL PROBATE ORDER

Supreme Court Dismisses Case in Williamson Estate.

HEIRS OBJECTED TO SALE.

Probate Court Ordered It, However, and Because of This an Appeal Was Taken.

The Supreme court today handed down an opinion in the case of Boyd Party, executor of the estate of Jonathan M. Williamson, deceased, vs. N. C. Furman, et al., appellants, in which it held that an order, permitting the executor of an estate to sell certain property of said estate to pay expenses of administration and a family allowance, is not appealable. The appeal is therefore dismissed at cost of appellants. A petition was filed in the probate division of the Third district court for permission to sell part of the property of the Williamson estate to pay expenses of administration. The heirs objected to the sale but the court ordered the sale to be made. The heirs appealed to the Supreme court and that court today decided that an appeal could not be taken upon such an order as it is not a final order of the court within the meaning of the statutes.
