# YOUNG CHRISTY **DEFEATS FRANCIS**

Opening of Salt Lake Athletic Club Well Attended.

THREE INTERESTING EVENTS

Colored Man Went Down in Sixth of What Was to Have Been & Twenty-Round Contest.

What was to have been a twentyround go between young Christy and Jim Francis was suddenly terminated in the sixth round at the Salt Lake Athletic club last evening, when the colored man went down and out by three straight arm body blows and a jolt on the jaw. The referee became a bit excited and forgot to count, but it was the unanimous opinion of those present that Francis was "out" at least twelve or fifteen seconds.

There were practically only two rounds of fighting-the fifth and sixth. In the first four rounds the men sparred cautiously, each waiting for an opening. Christy fought high while Francis assumed an unnatural position for him and fought low. The men feinted and worked patiently for an opening. During the whole contest Francis did not land a single blow upon his young op-ponent. The latter did not swing or at-tempt to rush the fighting except in the first part of the fifth, but soon dropped those tactics and forced the colored man to do the rushing. Christy's long left shot out repeatedly and jabbed the colored man on the nose and head until, becoming anxious, Francis became aggressive, and then Christy had him at his mercy. In every rough mix-up it was seen that Christy had decidedly the better of it. Waiting for a place to put it, the young fellow landed his right with telling effect, and Francis' eyes began to wobble. The colored man swung for his opponent's head, but over-reached himself and his finish came quickly. Quick as a flash, Christy was at him hammer and tongs, and doubled him up with a stiff punch in the wind. Before Francis could recover he received a straight left jab on the jaw. Four times he went to the floor, while the crowd yelled excitedly for the referee to count. The third time Francis went down his right hand fell under

him and his thumb was broken at the second joint so that the bones protrud-ed. He got his legs but was floored again and his seconds, unable to find a sponge, threw up a towel and lifted their man on a chair. A moment later he was taken to a physician to have his thumb set. It was an unfortunate acident but Francis will be around again

n a few days. The crowd simply went wild with enthusiasm and jammed around the ring to congratulate the victor, who was carried on the shoulders of Professor Eugene Thompson. Young Christy showed not the least sign of a struggle and from all appearances, could have gone the full twenty rounds.
