menced its season's run at the Og-den factory. It has on hand about 1,000 tons of beets and expects to re-ceive a sufficient supply of beets to enable it to make a continuous run until the end of the campaign. The factory has been hampered somewhat in starting by lack of fuel, but now has on hand between 800 and 900 tons of coal, and arrangements have been made by which fuel will be kept in supply in quantities sufficient to keep the factory running.
