AMATEUR ROBBER CLEVERLY CAUGHT

Holdup Enters a Saloon at Wells And is Captured by His Intended Victim.

COAL SOLD FOR CASH ONLY.

Ogden, Sept. 12.—A report was brought to Ogden yesterday afternoon of the bold work of a robber and his clever capture at Wells, Nevada. Tuesday evening a bartender was at his saloon all alone when a man came in and took a careful survey of the premises and called for a glass of beer. The glass was placed on the bar in front of him and the bartender went on with some work. The visitor remarked, "This would be a good place to hold up." This remark caused the bartender to look up and he found himself looking down the barrel of a 45 caliber pistol, and the usual command came for him to hold up his hands which he did. Then the robber directed his attention to the cash register. In order to open it he laid his pistol on the bar. In an instant the bartender grabbed the pistol and covered the robber at the same time. The robber was taken into custody. He was taken to the jail at Elko to await trial.

SUIT FOR RIGHT OF WAY.

Blackleg Vaccine Furnished Grazers On Forest Reserves Free—Notes.

Provo, Sept. 12.—The Telluride Power company has commenced a condemnation suit in the Fourth district court against Alfred R. Winter et al for a right of way to construct a conduit and a transmission line over the lands of defendants situated near the Pleasant Grove power plant of the plaintiff corporation.

Suit for divorce has been commenced by Catherine Brewer against William B. Brewer. Plaintiff charges desertion and asks for the custody of two minor children. The parties were married at Mantle, Utah, March 1, 1892.

FORESTRY BULLETIN.

Supervisor Pack of the Utah forests, has received the following bulletin from Washington:

Washington, Sept. 11.—Further evidence of the government's concern over the improvement of range conditions in the national forests is shown in the announcement just made that stock owners will be furnished, free of charge, supplies of vaccine for the treatment of stock afflicted with blackleg, tuberculosis and other animal diseases. This arrangement has been made by the Forest service, with Dr. A. D. Melvin, chief of the bureau of animal industry.

Stockmen holding permits for grazing in the national forests will now be furnished with an effective means of preventing without cost all the most dangerous diseases to which stock is subject. The vaccine can be obtained simply by applying to the supervisor of the forest upon which the stock is grazed, who will at once forward the approved request to the bureau of animal industry where it will be filled. Full directions will be furnished for its use.

The forest service and the bureau of animal industry are working hard in an endeavor to eradicate or diminish the common forms of stock diseases found in the western ranges and their efforts

are meeting with much success. It is anticipated that a large number of stockmen will avail themselves of this latest offer of assistance and as a result the loss of stock will be greatly reduced and range conditions improved.

DILEMMA OVER TEACHERS.

MORTALITY AMONG HORSES.

S. P. Teeples and Wood Bros. have lost five head of horses in the last six weeks with spinal meningitis; they have two more suffering with the disease, with little chance of saving them.

One of the veterinary doctors from the A. C. came down in response to a phone call, but it seems that little can be done to check the disease, when an animal is seized with it.

DILEMMA OVER TEACHERS.

The school board are in a dilemma over teachers. Reports are just being received from the last teachers' examination that a great many failed to pass. Of three teachers who have heard from the state board of examiners, two failed to get certificates. Notice has been given out that the school would open on the 16th inst., but where teachers will be secured is a problem.

It is felt that a change should be made in respect to the teachers' examination and have them held earlier in the season, or compel teachers to take the June examination. It would then give the school officers a chance to engage teachers holding certificates and not be obliged to wait until the schools should open, only to find that no teachers can be had.
