HEAVY DOWNPOUR IN WEBER.

The local weather observer, Ariel Van DeGraaf, reports that about a half an inch of rain had fallen in this section during the 24 hours ending at 6 o'clock last evening, but that this was much lighter than what had fallen south of the city.

The storm of yesterday was much heavier than it has been for several days. It caused the Ogden and Weber rivers to rise several inches within a few hours. A number of wooden paths and foot bridges recently completed at Sylvan park were almost completely deluged. The gutters in many parts of the city proved inadequate to carry off the water and as a result the sidewalks and streets were flooded.

Officials of the Amalgamated Sugar company stated that unless the storm speedily ceased the beet crop will be a failure in many parts of the county. Many beet fields in the lowlands are covered by miniature lakes and for more than 10 days the beets have been literally drowned.

MRS. GEIGER SUES FOR DIVORCE.

An action has been filed in the district court against Philip F. Geiger by Julia Geiger upon the grounds of non-support. This is the second action brought against Geiger for failing to care for his wife and children.

About a month ago Geiger was brought back from California by the state upon a warrant charging him with violating the law requiring a father to furnish food, shelter and clothes for his children. Geiger was given a preliminary hearing and was bound over to the district court under a \$500 bond.

The custody of the three children and reasonable alimony and attorney fees are asked for by the plaintiff in this action, which is represented by County Attorney Harris, who also prosecuted the case against Geiger for the state.

Y. W. C. A. FOR OGDEN.

There was an unusually large attendance at the Carnegie library at the recent meeting of the general committee of the Young Women's Christian Association and a great amount of interest manifested in the proceedings of the meeting.

Several of the leading business houses of the city were represented by young women employees. Both the merchants and employees have expressed themselves as being heartily in sympathy with the movement for the establishing of a home for the young women and ready to further it when the plans are definitely decided upon.

All of the committee reported progress in the work and expressed the opinion that plans of subscription for the home would be completed within a short while. Several prospective locations were mentioned and considered but no action was taken.

The committee to which was referred the subject of the appointment of a matron at the depot reported that it had met with the officials of the depot company and they promised to give the matter a full investigation and hope to grant the request.

STEADY WORK IN R. R. SHOPS.

The S. P. Railway company announce that the full shop force will resume work on Monday and will continue all summer.

Work on the viaduct, which has been suspended on account of the continued rains, will also be resumed on Monday.

POLICE COURT.

MONTANA TRAFFIC SUSPENDED.

On account of flood conditions in Montana, the local railroad ticket office here has been instructed from headquarters not to sell tickets to points where the state pending the receding of the floods.

BOLD DAYLIGHT BURGLARY.

The home of George Beech, 1247 Washington avenue, was entered by a burglar yesterday while members of the family were away from home and \$7 in money was taken. The thief gained an entrance by prying up a rear window. He pried open a dresser drawer and secured the money but did not take a watch and a number of pieces of jewelry which he left on the dresser. It is the opinion of the officers that he felt he had become frightened and hurried away leaving the jewelry. The officers have no clue.

CHARGED WITH FOUL CRIME.

Nathaniel Williams Held for Serious Offense—Old Folks Day.

Provo, June 5.—Nathaniel Williams, a widower, 74 years of age, was arrested yesterday on the complaint of A. B. Pack, charging him with a statutory offense, against Mrs. Pack, 12-year-old daughter, Elizabeth. Williams was arraigned before Justice A. A. Neen yesterday, who placed him under \$1,500 bonds until June 10, when he will have his preliminary hearing. The case is a most revolting one, the offense being committed over two years ago by the wretch enticing the little girl by giving her candy and money. The officers claim that there are seven other girls ranging from 12 to 17 years of age, and all daughters of respectable families, who are victims of his base degeneracy.

BELOVED TEACHER CALLED.

Impressive Obsequies Over Remains of Miss Lucella Stewart.

Pleasant Grove, Utah Co., June 4.—Very impressive funeral services were held in the meetinghouse here yesterday over the remains of Miss Lucella Stewart, who died at the Latter-day Saint hospital, Salt Lake City, May 29.

The services were presided over by Bishop S. L. Swensen; the choir rendered beautiful hymns and songs befitting the occasion. Elders Alexander Bullock and Joseph E. Thorne spoke eulogistically of the deceased. Elder John C. Swensen, representing the faculty of the B. Y. university, Provo, and Lars E. Eggertsen, county superintendent of schools, each dwelt upon the intellectual and moral attainments of Miss Stewart, who had been a student under their charge. The profusion of flowers and the great number of friends coming from Provo, Santaquin, Lehi, Salt Lake and other places bore evidence of the popularity and friendship of the beloved girl. Miss Stewart was a graduate of the B. Y. U. and since completing her normal studies had been engaged as a teacher in the district school in this county; the last two years she had been engaged in the Santaquin schools. She was a lovable young lady, beloved by all who had the pleasure of her acquaintance. She was the daughter of the late Charles Stewart and his wife Fanny E. Miss Stewart had been an energetic and faithful worker in the Y. L. association, as also in Sunday schools, and was a conscientious Latter-day Saint, in every way helping to promote the work. She was a successful teacher and her pupils loved her. She was born at Pleasant Grove, Sept. 14, 1873, where she spent her earliest days when the family (mother and one sister) moved to Provo where she could pursue her studies.
