#### Deputy Sheriff Who Has Dealt With Criminal On Other Occasions Will Be Prosecuting Witness.

Richard Deming, the convict now in the state prison, a desperado and pal of murderer Joe Sullivan, is in for more trouble. He is now serving a sentence

of ten years for robbery and in all probability will serve a much longer sentence if the authorities have their way.

Last evening Deputy Sheriff Axel Steele swore to a complaint before Judge C. B. Diehl of the criminal di ision of the city court, charging Deming with attempting to break out of the county jail. This offense is a felony and punishable by a long term in the state prison. If convicted of the offense, Deming will undoubtedly be sentenced to serve a term after the ex-piration of the one new in force.

On Jan. 21 last, Deming sawed a cou-ple of bars at the county jail, in the hope of liberating himself and Joe Suilivan, who was then confined there awaiting hearing on the charge of mur-dering Officer Charles S. Ford, The warrant of arrest was served on Dem ing at the state prison this morning, and he will likely be brought to town by state prison guards tomorrow morning and arraigned before Judge Dichl The fellow is now in solitary confine-

ment. Deming is the man who worked a smooth scheme to escape punishment for his crime. While being held at the county jall he feigned sickness, and so well did he play his part that phy-sicians were deceived. He was sent to the Holy Cross hospital and a guard placed over him, but he managed to escape from that institution and made placed his way to Portland, where he was captured. After being returned to this city, he was tried and convicted for robbery and sentenced to ten years in

Defining was a pal of Joe Sullivan and assisted the latter in a murderous attack on a fellow convict, Nick Prus-sing, last Saturday afternoon.

The state board of examining opticians has said the \$3 certificate is no guarantee of ability as an optician. I have not passed the board examination because I have never prevent ever examined."
