

HEARST DEFINES HIS ATTITUDE

Believes in Public Ownership of Public Utilities and Protection For Infant Industries.

AND ALSO IN LABOR UNIONS.

When He Entered Madison Square Garden Audience Greeted Him With Deafening Cheers.

New York, Sept. 28.—The state ticket of the independence league was ratified at a gathering that filled Madison Square Garden to its capacity tonight. The Municipal Reform alliance joined the league in the meeting.

The principal addresses were delivered by W. R. Hearst and Lewis Stuyvesant Chanler, respectively, the candidates for governor and lieutenant governor on both the Democratic and Independence league tickets.

Former Congressman John DeWitt Warner presided and evoked much applause when he declared that there had never before been a time "when the scoundrels of the state were so massed against a party as they are today against that led by William R. Hearst."

Mr. Chanler spoke briefly, concluding as follows: "I have always been a Democrat, and, in common with the rank and file of that party, it has been a source of infinite sadness to see it being gradually controlled by the same men and bound to the same interests that own and control the Republican party."

"We rejoice tonight that the rank and file of the Democratic party have freed themselves from the control of the corporations, have reassured the people and are about to regain their rights. We congratulate the Democracy of this state in that they have chosen as their standard bearer the leader of this independent movement, William R. Hearst."

When Mr. Hearst entered the Garden the audience greeted him with deafening cheers, while the band played and flags were waved. It was nearly a half hour before Mr. Hearst could make himself heard. He said in part:

"Before I received the nomination from any party I spoke at Syracuse and stated the principles in which I believed and formed my personal platform. Therefore, the nominations that have been given me were with a full understanding of exactly what I believe."

"I shall make the campaign according to my own honest opinions, and if elected shall conduct my administration according to my own convictions."

"I am a Jefferson Democrat, and that, as I understand it, is practically the same as a Lincoln Republican, for the Republican party was founded to reverse the function of the government in the principles of Washington and Jefferson."

"I believe in the impartial enforcement of the laws that exist."

"I believe in public ownership of public utilities."

"I believe the first qualification for public ownership is honesty in office and independence in voting."

"I believe that the protective principle is valuable in itself, but has been unreasonably extended and outrageously abused."

"I believe in protection for infant industries. I believe in protection for American labor. I believe the tariff should be modified and public ownership inaugurated, but that should be done cautiously and conservatively with regard to the stability of business and the perpetuation of what we all depend on."

"I believe in the restraint and regulation of trusts and monopolies by law."

"I believe in labor unions and farm-organizers and organizations that protect the distribution of wealth, and I believe that the prosperity of legitimate business men depends upon the purchasing power of the masses."

"I believe in every measure that gives the people more direct control of their government."

"I believe in direct nominations and one primaries."

"I believe in purity in politics."

"I will run in this campaign merely as representing the independence league, not merely the Democratic party, but I hope, the people of the state of New York; I appeal to them and make no pledge to them to retain for them."

FIRE AT ORO FINA, IDA.

Whole of Business Portion Burned, Loss \$75,000.

Lewiston, Ida., Sept. 28.—A special to the evening paper states that a fire, firmly believed to be of incendiary origin, wiped out the whole of the business section of Oro Fino, this county, early this morning, resulting in a financial loss of \$75,000, with insurance of less than \$20,000. Five business houses were burned, in addition to the postoffice, bank, newspaper offices, and a number of residences.

D. A. McKinney, proprietor of the hotel, in which the fire originated, has been placed under arrest, charged with arson. A population is greatly excited and threats of bodily harm have been made against McKinney, notwithstanding that his own family barely escaped in their night clothes.

REPUBLICAN HEADQUARTERS

In New York Moved From Fifth Avenue Hotel to 12 E. Thirtieth St.

New York, Sept. 28.—The Republican state committee has decided to transfer its headquarters from the Fifth Avenue hotel to 12 East Thirtieth street as soon as offices at the latter place can be fitted up.

At Republican, Democratic and Independence league headquarters there was much more activity today, campaign managers and candidates planning the speaking tours for the next few weeks.

The executive committee of the Independence league discussed fusion with the Democrats. The nomination for governor and lieutenant-governor are identical in league tickets. It is understood that there was a difference of opinion as to whether four league nominees should withdraw in favor of the Democratic candidates, or through petitions now being circulated, be placed on a separate column on the official ballot. Following the meeting it was announced that a special committee had been appointed to address the league candidates on the subject.

BRYAN COMPLETES HIS SOUTHERN TOUR.

End, Okla., Sept. 28.—William J. Bryan concluded his three days' tour of Oklahoma and Indian Territory today and left here tonight for Kansas City.

Mr. Bryan shows the effect of his strenuous trip through the south. His voice is hoarse and his last series of speeches was made with evident difficulty.

Fifty thousand people heard him at End this evening. His special train arrived at 6:30 over the Frisco from Alva and Geary, where he spoke to large audiences this afternoon. He was escorted by automobiles and a mounted guard of the Cherokee club downtown to a stand where he spoke.

At Geary some bitterness was shown because the school board refused to dismiss the city schools in order that the children might hear Mr. Bryan.

He left at 7 o'clock for Muskogee, which was the last point of his itinerary. Here he was greeted by a large crowd. He devoted part of his speech to remarks on the growth of the Indian territory. He declared he was delighted with the manner in which he had been received by the people.

The Bryan party returned from Muskogee at 8:30 and left immediately for Kansas City.

TWO TERRORISTS EXECUTED.

Warsaw, Sept. 28.—Two more revolutionists were shot today after trial in drumhead courtmartial. During the last three days 19 terrorists have been executed in Poland after such trials.

LABOR UNION MEMBERSHIP.

Upwards of Eight Million Wage Workers Now in Unions.

New York, Sept. 28.—A report of the state department of labor just issued states that there are now upwards of 8,000,000 wage workers in labor unions, one-fourth of whom are in the United States. Great Britain and Germany each have nearly as many unionists as the United States, but the countries in which the movement is comparatively new, Austria, Hungary, Italy, etc., are now making rapid progress.

TO STOP HAZING.

Chicago, Sept. 28.—A dispatch to the Tribune from Madison says: President Charles Van Hise of Wisconsin university proposed yesterday to a body of freshmen and sophomore students that the system of hazing be abolished and an orderly method of student discipline be substituted. He suggested that all cases of extreme hazing be reported to the student advisory committee, a sub-committee of which would act as a disciplinary board for freshmen and sophomores.

A STEEL TRUST DEAL.

New York, Sept. 28.—Interests representing the United States steel corporation and Hill iron ore property in the northwest held a conference here today, and from trustworthy sources it was learned that an agreement concerning this much discussed deal has been reached.

Formal announcement giving the terms of the transfer of the ore land to the steel corporation will soon be made. Only a few minor details remain to be worked out. It is expected that the terms will be to the material advantage of holders of the Hill railroad stocks, particularly Great Northern.

HURRICANE AT PENSACOLA, FLA.

Worst in Its History Rages Furiously All Night and All Day.

PROPERTY LOSS IS IMMENSE.

How Great That of Lives Unknown—Business District Is Submerged.

Pensacola, Fla., Sept. 28, via Flomaton, Ala.—The worst hurricane to visit this city in its history raged here furiously all last night and this morning and today, with a gale still blowing. The city presents a wrecked appearance, and the damage is estimated at \$5,000,000. The loss of life will be heavy among the mariners, but thus far only one body has been recovered, a man named George Morgan, a fisherman. Other bodies are reported along the shore, but have not been recovered.

Commencing at 7 o'clock last night, the wind blew at 50 miles an hour for three hours, then increased to 65 miles. From that time until 5 o'clock this morning it remained at about 80 and 90 miles an hour. The tides from the bay backed into the city for blocks, destroying homes and making rivers out of the streets.

When the gale was at its highest, and women and children were running frantically about the streets in darkness, an alarm of fire started in the confusion. The fire started in the Pitt mill near the business district, and horses of the fire department refused to go out in the weather. With tin roofs, trees and wires falling around them the firemen dragged their hose wagons by hand to the blaze and after hours of work controlled it.

This afternoon the water rose until the business district presented an almost indescribable scene. Of the 50 or 60 big steamboats and sailing vessels in the harbor only five or six remain. They have been driven ashore, and along the water front is a mass of wreckage from steamboats, towboats, launches and sailing craft. Thirty fishing vessels have been destroyed or damaged, and the three big fish wharves, with their wharves, are gone. Muscogee wharf and the Commandancia and Tarragona wharves of the Louisville & Nashville railroad are badly damaged. Great iron ships of 2,000 and 3,000 tons have been driven not only ashore, but have gone through houses a block from the water front.

Every house along the water front for 10 miles has been destroyed, and the wonder is that the loss of life is not greater. The tracks of the Terminal railroad to the navy yard and Barrancas have been destroyed, as also the trestles and bridges.

No communication can be had with the navy yard, but it is believed that it has been badly damaged. A number of warships were there, and these undoubtedly have been destroyed.

Every business house from the wharf on Pala Fox street to the Union station has been unroofed, many plate glass windows broken, stocks badly damaged, and wires and poles all mixed together.

There are no electric lights, no cars, no telephone or telephone service. The track of the Louisville & Nashville railroad on the Pensacola and Atlantic divisions has been destroyed for 20 miles, and two engines and cars sent out to the quarantine station have been lost.

Acting Mayor Maura ordered every saloon closed this morning, and 50 extra policemen have been sworn in. The homeless families are housed in all portions of the city, but many will walk the streets without food or a place to sleep until some order can be brought out of the chaos. Thieves are breaking open trunks along the beach, entering unoccupied houses and stealing everything in sight. Several arrests have been made, but it is impossible to protect property under such conditions.

Five sailors from a British steamboat were clinging to a roof that was washed ashore today. Three others from the same vessel were drowned.

War vessels at the Pensacola navy yard undergoing repairs were the gunboats Vixen, Machias, Isla de Luzon and Gloucester, besides several smaller crafts, and the quartermaster's steamer Poe. They were in an exposed position, and it is feared they may have been beached.

PLOT AGAINST THE CZAR'S LIFE

Discovered by Arrest of Terrorists in Quarters of Servants in Alexandria Palace.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 28.—A well laid plot against the life of the emperor and one with all the chances of success on its side, was uncovered today by the arrest of two armed terrorists, a man and a woman, in the quarters of one of the servants of the Alexandria palace, Peterhof, his majesty's closely guarded residence on Cronstadt bay.

The servant's son and another lackey named Klemm Klepnikoff, who were concerned in smuggling the terrorists through the guards were arrested also. Emperor Nicholas has been expected to return to Peterhof this week, and it is presumed that the terrorists intended to shoot him while he was promenading or playing with his children in the palace grounds.

Part of the great park at Peterhof is protected on one side by the waters of the bay, and on the other sides it is enclosed by a high wall surrounded with iron spikes. This wall is constantly patrolled by trusted Cossacks. Inside the palace grounds the only buildings are the unpretentious palace and two or three smaller houses for the servants.

The ramifications of the conspiracy, in which arrests have been reported almost daily since Sept. 18 when a lackey and several others were arrested, are extensive and may possibly have included two or more subdivisions, one directed at the emperor and the other against Grand Duke Nicholas. The arrests of these lackeys explain the manner in which threatening letters were introduced into the apartments of the emperor.

A general campaign of arrests and domiciliary visitations was inaugurated in St. Petersburg today. It is constantly patrolled by the Peterhof plot, but is an outcome of the recent arrival of

Warsaw Socialists who came to assist their St. Petersburg confederates in organizing a reign of terror here.

Several consignments of arms and ammunition which arrived by rail have been seized. An interesting comedy was played in the matter of one consignment. The police became cognizant of this shipment, and secretly set a watch on it in the hope of apprehending the consignees. When they arrived to carry away the arms the revolutionists prevailed this trap, set their own spies and almost succeeded in getting the arms from under the very noses of the officers. Similar seizures of ammunition and arms are reported from Warsaw and Moscow.

Replying to a telegram of congratulation from the League of Russian people at Teliavograd upon the "victory" displayed by the troops in the recent massacre at Seldice, Col. Tikhonovski, who was in command of the garrison during the excesses, sent a message which read:

"Greetings to the loyal Russian people; bayonets are mightier than rags." The commander referred to the garments of the poorer Jews.

VANCE AND SIMMONS

Acquitted of Charge of Murder of H. C. Tilden During San Francisco Fire.

San Francisco, Sept. 28.—Malcolm T. Vance and George W. Simmons, charged with the murder of Heber C. Tilden, a commission merchant, in this city on April 20 last, were acquitted today. Both defendants were members of the citizens' patrol organized after the earthquake and fire, and were charged with shooting Tilden for refusing to do so. They claimed that they thought the city was under martial law and that a shot was fired toward them from the automobile.
