INVESTIGATION **BEFORE CORONER**

Belief That Terrible Explosion at lackson Point Was Due to Carelessness.

WILLIAM L. PORTER, SEXTON.

As per adjournment, the coroner's inquest over the remains of those killed in the explosion at Jackson Point last Friday, met in Ogden at 1:30 p. m. yesterday and continued hearing the testimony of the witnesses.

Under the supervision of Justice of the Peace William Horsley, who is acting coroner of Boxelder county, the jurors, Chris Hansen, James Knudsen and William Wight, went to the hospital to get the evidence of the injured who are under treatment there. SCHOOL TRUSTEES MEET.

Utah County School Affairs - Wedding Bells-News Briefs.

Special Correspondence. Provo, Utah Co., Feb. 24 .- There was

a large attendance of trustees of the county-all except two districts being represented—at the meeting called by Superintendent Brown to meet at the courthouse yesterday. Reports were made by the trustees on the following topics: General condition of the schools progress, defects, free text books, en forcement of the compulsory attend-ance law, and the time of closing

schools. Special emphasis was given by Superintendent Brown to the enforcement of the compulsory school law. The matter of the time of closing schools was

considered and the trustees advised to determine this matter for themselves and not leave it to the people, as had been done in some places. The law places the duty of determining this matter on the trustees, and when the people are called together to decide it the result generally is that the faultfinders turn out to the meeting and de-cide the matter, while the majority of the people, who are really in accord

with the trustees, remain at home. The trustees were advised to engage teachers for next year early in April and were also advised not to encroach upon the rights of their neighboring districts by trying to get good teachers

away from them. The matter of the exhibit of school work to be given here was discussed and the advantages of the study of manual training were explained.

A statistical report of the schools for the years 1902 and 1903, prepared by Superintendent Brown, showed the percentage of enrollment, attendance, etc., and the average salaries paid to teachers in the various districts. The table shows generally an increase in attendance for the year 1903 over 1902, and when it did not the trustees were invited to look into the causes.

The following items taken from the report shows the highest and lowest

salaries paid in the county: Payson average salary paid male teachers, \$94,25; Spring Lake and Santaquin, average salary paid male teach-

ers, \$40. Tucker, average salary paid female teachers, \$77.50; Alpine, average salary paid female teachers, \$26.66.

John James Clark Instantly Killed While

Logging in Canyon.

It ap-pears that he and Charles Derricott were sawing down a large log. When it fell, it struck a dry standing tree, the top of which was broken off and instead of fall-ing with the saw log the recoil threw the broken piece back ever the two men, who were stand by the stump in snow up to their waists. "Jinmic," as he was familiarly known, shouled, "Look out Charley," but it seemed he did not, or could not move himself. As the words left his lips the fragment of tree struck him across the forehead, crushing in the front and top of his head and dislocating the neck. Death must have been instantane-
