At its meeting last night the city council unanimously confirmed the nomination made by the mayor of John D. Murphy as judge of the police court of Ogden city for the next 12 months, in place of Judge Howell, who resigned take his seat on the bench of the district court.

The mayor also disapproved of the sale of a piece of land located just north of the Ogden river bridge to Mr. Watts for \$50. The council decided to take a week to consider this veto. The mayor also sent in a veto of the council's previous action providing that the street supervisor make an estimate of the cost of repair. ing the streets which had been torn up during the construction of the sewer. The street committee explained that it was the intention to deduct the amount necessary for such repairs from the sum to be paid to the sewer contractor, and have the repairs made in the spring, The resolution was passed over the mayor's veto.

On recommendation of the law coinmittee the sum of \$100 was appropriated to each councilman as extra pay for services rendered while sitting on boards of equalization and the like.

A petition was received signed by the bricklayers, stonemasons and hodcarviers asking that the council extend the area within which the erection of frame buildings will not be permitted. The petition was referred to the fire committee.

The city engineer reported final estimates on curbing and guttering, paving, cement sidewalk construction and street intersection work. The total of the estimates is \$14,363.10.
