He placed two blasts of powder near together with the same length fuse, and after lighting them removed to a place of safety. In a few moments an explosion occurred and Mr. Lawles purposing both blasts blasts do av Lawler supposing both blasts had ex-ploded approached the place, when the second blast occurred throwing him a considerable distance, killing him inhim stantly.
