

## FOWLER'S TARIFF COMMISSION BILL

Provides for Commission of Fifteen That Shall Have Power to Fix Rates.

NO DOUBT CONSTITUTIONAL.

Prophesies Dire Things Unless Republican Party Gets Rid of Aldrichism and Cannonism.

Washington, Dec. 5.—Representative Charles W. Fowler of New Jersey to-night gave out a statement outlining the tariff commission bill which he will introduce in the house tomorrow.

The bill, as described by Mr. Fowler, provides that Congress shall fix the maximum and minimum tariff schedules, or rates, and that the commission, consisting of 15 members, shall, with the approval of the president, fix the actual rates to be paid at some point between the maximum and minimum rates so established by Congress.

But no rate so fixed and approved shall become effective or operative for 18 months after having been promulgated by the president, that every industry affected by tariff changes may have ample time to adjust itself to new conditions.

"If anyone should suggest," said Mr. Fowler tonight, "that such a commission could not constitutionally fix the tariff rates at any point between the maximum and minimum rates established by Congress because that would be an exercise of legislative power, let him ask himself whether the power so to fix rates is such a stretch of legislative power as that given to the interstate commerce commission and approved by the supreme court to fix a reasonable railroad rate."

Mr. Fowler declares it to be perfectly clear "that unless the Republicans get rid of Aldrichism and Cannonism, the people will get rid of the Republican party."

He asserts that the people's hopes have been turned to disgust, and their faith to resentment, and he says he does not believe that they will permit Mr. Aldrich "to stick the daggers through the leg of the Republican party."

He prophesies a "thunderbolt of righteous indignation and punitive wrath," as about to strike, shatter and paralyze the Republican party unless it utterly repudiates Aldrichism and its subservient implement, Cannonism.

Impending defeat and the loss of the next house of representatives, Mr. Fowler says, can be avoided only "by emphasizing on our party banners these pledges:

"First, we are against Aldrichism and Cannonism.  
"Second, we demand tariff revision hereafter by evolution and not revolution.  
"Third, we demand tariff revision based upon ascertained facts and not upon selfish trades and corrupt agreements.  
"Fourth, we demand a permanent, broad and responsible commission which shall ascertain these facts, obviate trade wars and assist in securing and retaining the good will and friendship of all nations by wise, just and advantageous trade treaties."

## COL. ROOSEVELT PROUD OF HIS TROPHIES

Nairobi, British East Africa, Nov. 2.—Col. Roosevelt and R. J. Cunningham arrived at Nairobi on Oct. 29, from an extended hunting trip. They were delighted with their expedition and Col. Roosevelt said he and Kermit were proud of having got their elephants and especially proud that they had each got one when they were unaccompanied by such experienced hunters as Cunningham and Burton. The skins of the elephants and the skulls and bones were brought in by porters.

Sir Percy Girouard, governor of the protectorate, who was waiting to Uganda, stopped to pay his respects to the former president of the United States. The following day the Roosevelt party went to Nairobi. There the station was crowded with officials and settlers. Lord Delamere was among those to greet the ex-president, and they stood for a few minutes discussing his proposed visit to Lord Delamere's ranch at Njoro on his return from the Guazo Ngusho.

On Monday, the 25th, the party left again for London. The train for the Guazo Ngusho was to be made. On this trip the party passed over the "Mau summit," 8,500 feet, the highest point on the railway. Thence it was a gradual descent to Londiani. The following day Edmund Heller, Kermit Roosevelt and Leslie A. Turlion started for Eldama ravine and were followed shortly afterward by Col. Roosevelt. The journey to their shooting place will occupy one week, and they will spend three weeks shooting there.

Col. Roosevelt's hunt at Njoro with Lord Delamere in December will end his first African hunting. Then on for Uganda and down the Nile to Cairo. A party, including Cunningham, went from Nairobi to Entebbe, the capital of Uganda, to arrange for the Roosevelt party's trip down the Nile. It is believed that Col. Roosevelt and Kermit will arrive at Entebbe about Dec. 20. They will remain at Entebbe for three days and then will go by motor car to Kampala, 23 miles.

**COSTS TEN THOUSAND TO PRODUCE SECOND LIEUT.**

Chicago, Dec. 6.—William E. Curtis, writing for The Record-Herald, says: "Col. Hugh L. Scott, superintendent of military academy at West Point, estimates that it costs the government of the United States \$10,000 to produce a second lieutenant out of the raw ma-

terial which is sent to that institution from the several states and congressional districts every year. In making this estimate he bases his calculations upon the current expenses of maintaining the academy, which are about \$1,000,000 a year, and the average number of cadets for the last few years, which has been about 400. He does not take into account the original cost of the educational plant or repairs or improvements or the interest upon the investment which the government has made in the facilities for educating soldiers, which, by the way, are unsurpassed elsewhere in all the world."

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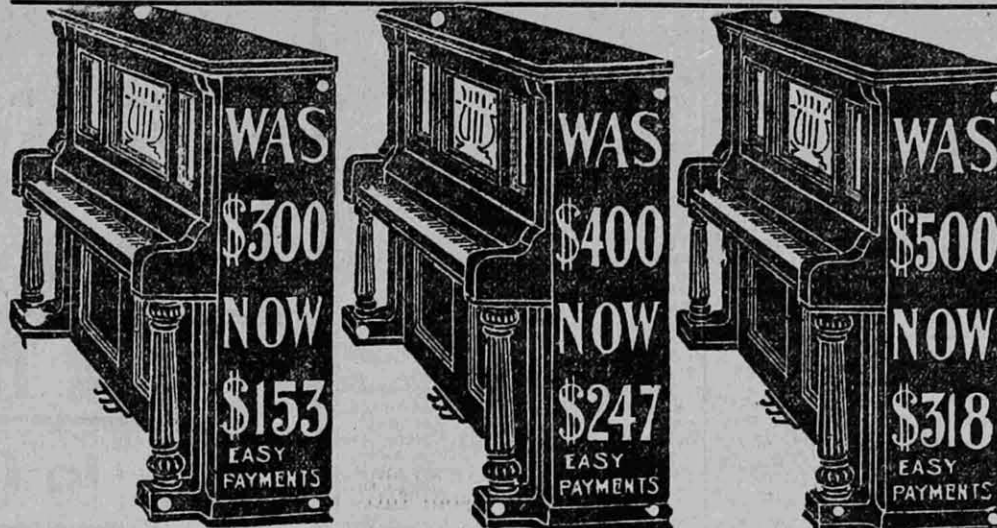

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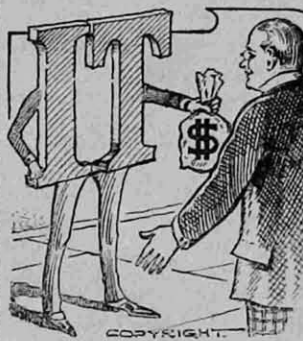
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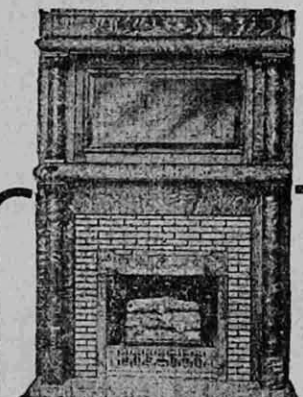
