WASHINGTON, May 8.—The ques-
tion of the right of the United States
to take the *Emerson* on high seas
and to capture her has been
settled.

The Spring Garden National Bank

Closed.

PHILADELPHIA, May 8.—The Spring
Garden National Bank closed its doors
at 12 o'clock this morning. The follow-
ing notice was posted on the door of
the vault room of the Spring Garden
Bank, which is now said to be closed:
"This bank is now, and will remain
closed, until further notice. We trust
you will excuse us for any inconven-
ience." This is signed by W. F. Drew,
national bank examiner.

The news of the closing spread rapidly
and the public, who had intended
to withdraw their funds, were greatly
alarmed. President Kennedy said:

"We have no reason to believe that
the bank is in any financial difficulty.
The withdrawal of deposits during the
financial trouble last September and
November was due to the fact that
the managers demands on our resources

were found to be only temporary."
