There were 144 mountain lions killed and paid for in 1884; 161 in 1885; for which \$1,288 came out of the territorial treasury; and this year the figures promise to run up to 200 or thereabouts. Mountain llons in that section attain a prodigious size. Specimens are often killed measuring nine feet from tip to tip, and weighing not far from 250 to 300 pounds. Many more measuring ten to eleven feet are frequently bagged, and occasionally a monster reaching twelve feet clear, and perhaps ; longer, is brought down by ome lucky and daring hunter.
