EVENING NEWS. --- **Saturday, July 23, 1887.** --- **TO THE BOYS** **On the Street Corners.** Boys, have you not mistaken the place? Are you out in the wrong shop? I have noticed that for some time past you have faithfully attended this corner from two to six nights, amounting to from four to twelve hours in the week, sixteen to forty-eight in the month, and from one hundred and twenty-eight to three hundred and eighty-four in a year, leaving out four winter months (seloom better employed). At first I thought: "These are worthless boys, having no families to become acquainted with street corners." But now I know better.

leaders. "They seek only what they are learning," and you who have made a habit of it only know what *that* means. You have been so busy picking up dirt during the last year—just reckon it up, will you?" And so the speaker went on, until we all have often passed by, with only a wish that no boy of mine may ever forget to take him to the same place, to seek the same information (or at least to be sure to get it). But of late a closer observation of your faces and manners when seen elsewhere, at work, in the stores, in the streets, in the hall, etc., has moderated my views. Your aims in life: see in your countenance and in your manner, a certain self-reliance, a slight realization that there is such a thing as a future before you. This is the first step, and it is for those who excel in the better capacities of life, leads me to believe you sometimes wish yourselves to become leaders. But I am glad to see you in society beside you wistfulness and

have thought, many have been around the street corner—that you really wish to become useful to your fellow men. You have been following others and a lack of consistency in your own actions. Now I say one, we know these things are not learned on the street corners, we go there to find them. We find that their chief accomplishments are any less nappy than the hair of the boys who hang around there. They get more "fun" and

have ever imagined, and you will wonder where the "fun" comes in, so much more intense will have become the desire to be a boy. You will be so much fully believe me now, but you would then.

Now, if you deprive the boys of their recreation? No! Rather would I deprive myself of every comfort I have, than deprive the boys of their recreation. Young faces by trying to make old men of them before their time, say, do not deprive them of their recreation. many recreations that result in some degree of compensation. If the course they went elsewhere to enjoy the same, such as singing classes, or to study or practice with a companion at his home, provided the companion would return the compliment.

Once more, let me for a moment re-emphasize that the law of compensation of the evil that this apparently "harmless" habit leads to is not a mere misapprehension. It is not gambling, and is not that to saloon visiting, and that to utter ruin. Did you know that the first time you first time from a home to a saloon, led whether under the same circumstances or not, you are on the direct from the careless street corner pounding? Think well of it, boys. You should not be so sure that you are honest. True, your ruin might carry

with it the ruin of her happiness, but she is not to be deterred by these things; besides, how much nobler and more pleasant it is to do anything that is good, on one's own initiative, to do it, than when it is crowded upon us by our parents or others! Think seriously what is best for your own welfare, and then do it. You have the task of laying up happiness for yourself, and be assured on will marshall your powers to the task. Do not forget the course you are taking, remembering well that home and interesting studies lead to all happiness and contentment, and that the idling away of the hours on street corners leads one the opposite way—to idleness, to idleness, to idleness.
