Wasatch Wonderland .- Ernest S. Penrose, Esq., in a jaunt through Wasatch County, happened across some dicial District of the Territory of Utah. On the 11th of November, 1838, interesting country which he describes as follows:

Midway is a small settlement situated at the foot of the Wasatch range of mountains on the western side of Provo Valley. About a quarter of a mile northeast of the settlement are about a dozen springs, or pots, warm and hot, of various sizes and depths. I was invited by Brother R. R. Ross, Jr., to take a ride out to the springs, to one of which, the largest, he said they had never found the bottom. The water is very hot and contains a great deal of sulphur and lime, which overflows and forms a porous kind of rock which in time becomes very hard. The ground food with relish.
