LOCAL BRIEFS.

The level of the great lake is 8 of a foot below the zero mark, the same as it was 15 days ago.

Albert Wilson, brother-in-law of W. E. Bray of this city, has died at Los Angeles of consumption.

Section Director Hyatt of the weather office is in Wasatch county distributing instruments to voluntary observers.

Word from London states that Mrs. Fred S. Luff of this city, who is visiting abroad, has just given birth to a child.

Coal dealers say that the time for all apprehension has passed, and coal can be delivered on the same day that it is ordered.

The local nursery men are in good spirits over the spring outlook, and say that there is a steady and good demand for all kinds of shade and fruit trees.

There will be a mass meeting Sunday at 3:30 p. m. in the First Presbyterian church in connection with the W. M. C. A. movement. Rev. Dr. Corburn will speak.

Former Deputy City Treasurer George H. Wood has left the treasurer's office and enters upon the duties of his new position as real estate agent for G. S. Holmes.

Mrs. L. Brooks Vincent addressed the teachers in the city schools yesterday afternoon, on "Alaska and the Eskimoes," the talk being based on personal observation.

Farmers are holding back their hay from city sale in order to push up the price, so the local dealers say. The result is that prices have gone up as expected, by \$1 per ton.

Mrs. Windsor V. Rice has presented St. Mark's cathedral with a Carrera marble floor. In memory of her sister, the late Mrs. J. S. Ferris. The floor will arrive next week.

State Auditor Edwards yesterday distributed warrants for the salaries of the clerical force of the state offices for the month of January. The amount of the payroll was about \$1700.

The daughters of the American Revolution will celebrate Washington's birthday with a luncheon at the Alta club, and an attendance of about 100 is expected. Mrs. C. S. Kinney is to be the toastmistress.

Senator Bamberger left yesterday for New York on business connected with his road. He intends making of his journey a purchase in the Davis county, a future site for suburban residences, with all the modern improvements.

St. Mark's charity association is having a big day of it at the Walker Bros. store, intending to make of it the biggest day of the week in the charity sales. Various booths have been built for serving tea and wafers, and large crowds are in attendance.

F. A. Rosenfeld has sold to E. B. Wickes, 495x185 feet on Third South street, near Second, 200 ft. street, for \$125 per front foot, or nearly \$2,500. J. B. Thompson has sold to local parties the same size lot a little further in, and on the same street for \$225 per front foot.

Dr. S. H. Pinkerton will sever his connection with St. Mark's hospital on the 15th inst., to join the staff of the Groves L. D. S. hospital. The Oregon Short Line patients will be cared for at the L. D. S. on and after that date, instead of at St. Mark's hospital as at present.

Mrs. Kate Tucker (Chapin) of Los Angeles, sister of Mrs. Milla T. Maynard and Mrs. Margaret T. True of Denver, and a noted club woman and Shakespearean scholar, is dead. The two Denver ladies were in this city two days ago en route to their sister's side, but arrived just too late.

Second Lieut. S. H. Guthrie of the Artillery corps at Fort Douglas, has been transferred to the Twenty-sixth Light battery, and ordered to the Philippines. Private Rudolph Maith of the Nineteenth battery at Fort Douglas has been transferred to the Twenty-third battery of heavy artillery, Fort Columbia, Washington.

The Nephi Plaster Manufacturing company of Nephi has filed application with the state engineer for 50 acres of water from Salt creek in Juab county, for power purposes. The company will set up a 45-inch Pelton turbine wheel with 150 ft. head giving 350 horse power for electric lighting and power at the mill.

There are 16 teams at work on the Saltair swimming pool project, and this force is to be increased by the addition of 30 teams, making 46 in all. This will give ample horse power to the construction work. A sand pump has to be used along the outward edge of the pool on account of the water in which the horses can not work.

The cloudy weather continues, and is likely to continue indefinitely, or until the stagnant atmospheric area which has been brooding over this region, is pushed to the eastward by a low barometric area from the Pacific ocean. When this will occur no one can tell, as the air currents out over the ocean are an indeterminate quantity.

A copy of the articles of incorporation of the Western Lime and Marble company of Nephi was filed in the secretary of state's office yesterday afternoon. The capital stock of the company is \$50,000, divided into shares of the par value of \$1 each. Dr. J. M. Foster is president; Mat T. Howard, vice president; W. C. Andrews, secretary and treasurer.

The first badge to be worn by the Elks excursionists has been received at the club house in this city, and is now being worn with pride by Secy. Raybould. It consists of a white ivory button with "Elks No. 85" thereon; and to the button are attached two silk ribbons on one of which is printed "Salt Lake," and on the other "Los Angeles." The printing is all in Elk purple. Quantities of

these badges will be ready in a day or two.

Last evening's Washington dispatches indicate that the changes in the postoffice recommended by Postmaster Thomas will be allowed by the department. The changes include removal of the letter drops to the vicinity of the mailing clerks, the enlargement of the registry room and the addition of a third window to the registry department. Other minor alterations will also be made.

The careless throwing out of the window of a cigarette from one of the railway offices on the fifth floor of the Deseret News Annex was the occasion of considerable and unusual excitement yesterday afternoon. The cigarette fell on the awning of a window on the fourth floor and soon the canvas was ablaze. A stiff wind was in progress and the flames quickly crept into the woodwork about the window where it was discovered and an alarm turned in. The fire department made a rapid run and soon extinguished the flames. The loss was inconsequential.

"When" was the subject of Evangelist Corburn's preaching last night, in the First Baptist church, the idea being the necessity of taking the step and becoming a Christian now, and not putting it off. The speaker cited a number of instances within his personal knowledge of persons who had put it off, and before they knew what it was they were taken away. Dr. Corburn held that becoming Christians would make true men and true women out of everybody; but no one can think with safety that they can sin all their lives and then when health fails and old age comes on, they can repent and be saved.

A telephone company, of which Senator Power of Montana, is the president, is building west through North Dakota to which point it is the intention of the Rocky Mountain Bell company to build from Miles City, as soon as the extension shall have been built from Billings. The connection, it is believed, will be made within 15 months, at which time it will be possible for Salt Lake people to ring up St. Paul and Minneapolis, and talk with those centers with the same ease as with points immediately north of this city. General Manager Murray of the Bell company has returned from attendance at the opening of the new switchboard in Helena, Mont.
