In addi-tion to the Marietta on the Honduran Caribbean coast, which is the point re-garded as most in danger, the Faducah is further south on the Nicaraguan coast. ENGLISH CHANNEL TUNNEL PROJECT KILLED.

London, March 21.—The revived project of tunneling the English chan-nel received its death blow, at least, for a long time to come, by the an-nouncement in parliament today of the government's well considered decision against the enterprise. HIS PRIVILEGES CURTAILED.

He is Driving a Hard Bargain, Believing He Alone Can Furnish Evidence Against Bribe Takers.

San Francisco, March 21 .-- The grand jury today resumed its work of investigating the alleged wholesale graft and corruption in the municipal affairs of this city and adjourned until 11 o'clock Saturday morning. The entire day was taken up in probing further into the alleged bribing of the supervisors by the telephone com-

panles on which 27 indictments have already been based. The grand jury made a determined effort to trace the \$50,000 alleged to

have been paid by T. V. Halsey, representing the Pacific States Telephone and Telegraph company to 10 of the supervisors to prevent the granting of a franchise to the Home Telephone

supervisors to prevent the granting of a franchise to the Home Telephone company. For the purpose almost all of the officials and books of the Fa-cific States company were taken before the grand jury by Secret Service Agent Burns. Among the officials er-amined were Henry T. Scott, presi-dent; E. J. Zimmer, formerly auditor, but now vice president; B. C. Carroll, general agent; John S. Curran, adjust-er; A. B. Cooper, station man; C. J. Hall, secretary to T. V. Halsey, the former general agent; T. S. Sherwin, auditor, and Frank D. Drum, a direc-tor of the company. The latter emerged from the grand jury room nervous and excited and as-saulted a newspaper photographer who attempted to take his picture. President Scott was in the jury room but a few minutes, and upon coming out declined to discuss the testimony given beyond that he had "answered all questions put to him." Auditor Sherwin was requested to explain the bookkeeping methods of the company; was asked about the various amounts on the books which were paid to Hal-sey, but declared that the accounts showed no such sum as \$50,000 or any considerable part as having been used of looking after the publicity depart-ment and of "gathering data on the oposition." Miss Nellie Smith, stenographer to Gerstle, Frick & Beedy, the attorneys who represented the Home Telephone company in the obtaining of a fran-chise from the supervisors, who re-called to day and spent over an hour in the grand jury room. Swears He Was Promised it to a Certain Extent by a Government Representative.

TRIED TO BRIDE GRAND JURY.

Admits That After Conviction and Before Sentence He Was Engaged In Criminal Operations.

Washington, March 21.-Again S. A. D. Puter testified for the government in the Hermann trial regarding fraud and bribery in many land deals. Just as his cross-examination was closing Atty. Worthington for the defense asked

"Were you ever promised immunity by the representative of the government for your testimony?

"To a certain extent I have been,"

"To a certain extent I have been," was the answer. Puter explained that after he had been convicted in the case for which he is now serving a two-year sentence in Oregon he had gone at once to United States Atty. Heney and of-fered to tell him all he knew about hand frauds. He had many conferences with Heney, as a result of which the witness testified: "Heney told me that if I became a witness for the government he would not press those other indictments against me, but would have them dis-missed when the time came." Puter said he received no special favors in jail, but was locked in a cell as any other prisoner. He was a wit-ness for the government in land fraud cases in Oregon last September, and Atty, Worthington read from his testi-mony at that time a statement that

Atty. Worthington read from his testi-mony at that time a statement that he regretted he did not know more to teil about the Blue Mountain forest reserve deal. He said that Mays had not let him in on that deal, as had been promised. "Did you try to bribe the grand jury that indicted you?" asked Mr. Worth-ington?

"Did you try to bribe the grand jury that indicted you?" asked Mr. Worth-ington? "I did," was the answer. The witness explained that he had given a man named Brownells \$50 to influence two of the grand jurors to see that a "true bill" was not returned against him. This effort failed. "Were you engaged in criminal oper-ations after your conviction and prior to your sentence?" was the next ques-tion of the cross-examiner. "Yes, to a certain extent. That is, I was dealing in a great deal of state land with alleged fraudulent title." Questions by Mr. Worthington de-veloped that Puter had not been asked about the correspondence he had with Hermann, by the United States attor-neys, until last January, although the witness said he must have told Heney about the letters, also the government attorneys would not have followed the matter up by coming to him in fail. United States Atty. Baker said at this point, that a search was being made by Futer which had been referred to. Mr. Eaker produced one letter writ-ten by Puter to Hermann, taken from the files of the office, but which related to the timber claims. This was put in evidence by Mr. Worthington "who, after reading it, turned to the witness and asked: "Was that deal crooked, too?" The witness assented with a nod of "Was that deal crooked, too?"

"Was that deal crooked, too?" The witness assented with a nod of his head, but explained that it was of a different character than the other matters. It was a timber claim. Mr. Worthington dwelt some time on the statement of Puter that he had, while in Washington in 1902, regard-ing the "eleven-seven" claims, talked to Asst. Commissioner Richards. To the direct questions, whether Hermann had not told the witness that the mat-ter had been turned over to Richards, and that he would attend to the mat-ter, the witness answered in the nega-tive.
