## A Big Panhandle Farm.

DAMSITE is the name of a new town in Texas. It was recently given recognition by the United States postal authorities and its name is found among the list of post-

offices in the latest edition of the official postal guide. There is nothing blasphemous in the name of the town. Its surroundings could hardly be more peaceful and pastoral. The town is less than two years old. It is the center and the headquarters of one of the largest private irrigation enterprises in the United States.

The men who are owners of the big system of irrigation and of most of the town itself are Colonel Cecil Lyon of Sherman, Tex., member of the Republican National committee and chairman of the Republican state executive committee; J. S. Rice and W. M. Rice of Houston. Colonel Lyon promoted the project and named the town. The system of irrigation covers 10,000 acres of land. There is no land-selling scheme behind the project. The three owners of the big farm are devoting their whole energies to raising crops of various kinds of products upon the land and to selling them for the best prices that can be obtained.

This big farm is situated within 10 miles of the Oklahoma line. It is in the Panhandle portion of Texas where only a few years ago it was the popular belief that such a thing as successful agriculture was impossible. When Colonel Lyon and his associates purchased this tract of land they determined to make doubly sure of raising crops each year by putting the whole tract under irrigation. In order to obtain a water supply they had a large dam constructed and leading from this water storage reservoir is a main ditch 11 miles long and having many lateral ditches. This system of canal and ditches leads the water to every part of the immense acreage and there is no possibility of the crops suffering from lack of moisture. Among the crops which have been decided upon for planting this coming season are 2,000 acres in soft wheat; 100 acres in macaroni wheat; 800 acres in oats; 1,000 acres in cotton; 500 acres in alfalfa and probably a large acreage in sugar beets. The employment of 200 farm hands will be constantly required upon this big farm. Eight harvesting machines were purchased for cutting the wheat and oats crop. Some idea of the up-to-date methods of farming which are employed and which have been made possible by establishing a model town at the damsite may be had when it is stated that more than \$50,000 has been expended by Colonel Lyon and associates in this enterprise up to this time.

Although the town of Damsite is a part of the big farm, its residents are free to live pretty much as they may choose so long as they are industrious and lawabiding citizens. The town is situated in the center of the 10,000-acre tract of land. The streets are broad and straight. The buildings which Colonel Lyon and associates have erected for the accommodation of their employees are attractive and comfortable in every respect. A large commissary store is conducted here as a part of the farm enterprise. The erection of a farm boarding house and a large amusement hall has just been finished. Everything possible is being done to make Damsite a model community. The farm hands live in the town, where their children are given the advantage of a good public school. Entertainment and amusements of various kinds are given for the pleasure of the people.

The lake formed by the dam covers

1,250 acres of land to a depth of several feet. It is well stocked with bass and other fish and in another year the people of the town will be afforded fine fishing sport.

A number of substantial improvements to the town are planned for the coming year. Among them are the erection of a large elevator for handling the wheat and oats which are grown upon the farm and the installation of a cotton ginning plant.

The success of this big farming enterprise has attracted much attention throughout the panhandle section of the state. Many of the large ranch owners are converted to the idea that farming pays much better than cattle raising and they are preparing to put their hands under cultivation.

## Polar Days and Nights.

**D**URING a polar winter the average thickness of ice on the ocean where no storms or strong tides interfere reaches six feet or more. Nansen found a thickness of over eight feet.

There is really no warm season. Even during the long summer days snow still falls frequently. Clear spells are relatively warm, but, especially in the Antarctic, fogs and clouds are frequent, while winds bring low temperatures.

Nevertheless, the summer near the margins of the Arctic zone is described in the Journal of Geography as having clean, pure, crisp air, free from dust and with little precipitation. The monotony and darkness of the polar night is decreased a good deal by the long twilight, due to the high degree of refraction at low temperatures. The sun actually appears and disappears some days before and after the times which are geometrically set for the change.

Light from moon and stars, and from the aurora, also relieve the darkness. Optical phenomena of great variety, beauty and complexity are common. Solar and lunar halos, and coronae, and mock suns and moons are often seen. Auroras seem to be less common and less brilliant in the Arctic than in the Arctic. Sunset and sunrise colors within the polar zones are described as being extraordinarily brilliant and impressive.

Thus the north polar summer, in

spite of its drawbacks, is in some respects a pleasant and healthful season. But the polar night is monotonous, depressing, repelling. An everlasting uniform snow covering, rigidity, lifelessness, silence—except for the howl of the gale or the cracking of the ice.

Small wonder that the polar night has sometimes unbalanced men's minds. The first effects are often a strong desire for sleep, and indifference. Later effects have been sleeplessness and nervousness, tending in extreme cases to insanity, anæmia, digestive troubles.

Extraordinarily low winter temperatures are easily borne if the air is dry and still. Nansen notes "not very cold" at a temperature of -22 degrees, when the air was still. Another explorer, at 9 degrees, says "it is too warm to skate."

Zero weather seems pleasantly refreshing if clear and calm. But high relative humidity, and wind—even a light breeze—bring the same degree of "penetrating" feeling of chill which may be unbearable. Thus the damper air of spring and summer usually seems much colder than the drier air of winter, although the temperatures may be the same.

When exposed directly to the air the skin burns and blisters; the lips swell and crack. Chills have been much complained of by polar explorers, and is surely due to the active evaporation from the warm body into the dry, relatively cold air.

There is no doubt that polar air is singularly free from micro-organisms—a fact which is due chiefly to lack of communication with other parts of the world. Hence diseases which are common in temperate zones, "colds" among them, are rare.
