By James Duane Doty, Governor of Utah Territory.

To all whom it may concern:—

At the General Election held in each precinct in the several counties of the Territory of Utah, on the first Monday in August, A. PERSONAL APPEARANCES OF CONFEDERATE GENERALS.

General Longstreet is described as an Alabamian—a thick-set man, forty-three years of age. He was an Infantry Major in the old army and now commands the First Corps d'Armes. By the soldiers he is invariably spoken of as the best fighter in the whole army. His "war endurance is most extraordinary. He seems to require neither food nor sleep."

General Ewell is a remarkable looking old soldier, bald, with a prominent nose, and rather a haggard, sickly face; having so lately lost his leg above the knee, he is still a complete cripple, and falls off his horse occasionally. Directly he dismounts he has to be put on crutches. He was Stonewall Jackson's coadjutor during the celebrated valley campaigns, and proves an efficient successor to that General, who was much indebted to him for many of his victories. He used to be a great swearer—in fact, he is said to have been the only person who was unable to restrain that propensity before Jackson; but since his late (rather romantic) marriage, he has (to use the American expression) "joined the church."

General Pendleton, Chief of Artillery, was a West Pointer, but in more peaceable times he fills the post of Episcopal clergyman in Lexington, Virginia. Unlike General P. O. K., he unites the military and clerical professions together, and continues to preach whenever he gets a chance. On these occasions he wears a surplice over his uniform.

General Pickett commands one of Longstreet's divisions. He wears his hair in long ringlets, and is altogether rather a desperate looking character. He is the officer who, as Captain Pickett, of the United States Army, figured in the difficulty between the British and the United States in the San Juan Island affair, under Gen. Harney, four or five years ago.

General Jacob Stuart is a good-looking, jovial character, exactly like his photographs. He is a good and gallant soldier, though he sometimes incurs ridicule by his harmless affectation and peculiarities. The other day he rode through a Virginia town, his horse covered with garlands of roses. He also departs considerably from the severe simplicity of dress adopted by other Confederate Generals; but no one can deny that he is the "right man in the right place."—[Blackwood's Magazine.]

He died in the faith of a glorious resurrection, leaving a large family and many friends to mourn his loss.
