Gameral Longstreet is described as an Alabanilan - a thick-set man, forty-three years of age. He was an infantry Major in the eld army and now commands the First Corps d'Armee. By the soldiers he is invariably spoken of as the best fighter in the whole army. His "war endurance is most extraordinary. He's ems to require neither food nor sleep."

Gen-ral Ewell is a remarkable looking old soldier, bald, with a prominent mose, and rather a haggard, sickly face; having so lately lost his leg above the knee, he is sill a complete cripple, and falls off his borse occasionally. Directly he dismounts he has to be put on crutches. He was Stonewall Jackson's coadjutor during the celebrated valley carapaigns, and proves an efficient successor to that General, who was much indebted to him for many of his victories. He used to be a great swearer-in fact, he is said to have been the only person who was unable to restrain that propensity before Jackson; but since his late (rather romantic) marriage, he has (to use the American expression) "joined the church."

General Pendleton, Chief of Art l'ery, was 2 West Pointer, but in more peaceable times he fils the post of Episcopal clergyman in Lexington, Virginia. Unlike General Po'k, he unites the military and clerical professions together, and continues to preach whenever ke gets a chance. On these occasions he wears

a surplice over his uniform. General Pickett commands one of Longstreet's division. He wears his hair in leng ringlets, and is altogether rather a desperate looking character. He is the officer who, as Captain Pickett, of the United States Army, figured in the difficulty between the British and the United States in the San Juan Island affair, under Gen.
