OIL INDUSTRY AND FREIGHT RATES

President Sends Special Message to Congress on Sublect of Their Relation.

TRANSMITS GARFIELD REPORT

Shows Very Clearly That the Standard Oil Co. Has Had Special Favors.

Favors Retention by Government of Fee to Coal and Oil Lands in Indian Territory and on Public Domain.

May 4.-President Washington. Roosevelt today transmitted to Congress the report of James R. Garfield, commissioner of corporations, giving the results of his investigation of the subject of transportation and freight rates in connection with the oil industry.

REPORT IMPORTANT.

In his message the president expressed the view that the report is of capital importance because of the effort now being made to secure such enlargement of the powers of the interstate commerce commission as will , confer upon the commission power confer upon the commission power in some measure adequate to meet the clearly demonstrated needs of the situation. The facts set forth in the report, he declares, are for the most part not disputed. That the Standard Oil company has benefited enormously up almost to the present moment by secret rates, many of which were clearly unlawful, the president says the report clearly shows, the benefit thereby secured amounting to at least three quarters of a million a year. On this subject he says:

This perspective map shows in a general way the extent of the earthquake shock in California. There appears to be no system in the movement of an earthquake; Berkeley, near San Francisco, was hardly damaged, while San Jose and Salinas and Santa Rosa suffered almost complete demolition. As far as reported in the press dispatches,

the towns where the shock was distinctly felt on the fatal Wednesday morning were: San Francisco, Oakland, San Jose,

Ocean View, Petaluma, Emoryville. Although earthquakes of more or less

violence have been frequent during the last 3,000 years in the eastern hemis-phere, or old world, the western hemisphere, or old world, the western heads phere, particularly North America, has been singularly free from disastrous seismic shocks. The shock which dis-rupted San Francisco was the most erious that has been felt in this coun-This earthquake is not the first that

This earthquake is not the first that has occurred in that section of the country. As late as Oct. 14, 1901, the town was shaken by a shock, and al-though a great deal of excitement pre-vailed, not very nuch damage was done to property. The first serious shock that 'Frisco got was in 1865. On

shock that 'Frisco got was in 1865. On Oct, 8 of that year there were rum-blings in the town, and some of them toppled over. Three years later San Francosco was shaken by an earth-quake, which proved to be more serious than the one of 1865. A good many acres of ground were shaken by the unbeaval. upheaval.

upheaval. Slight shocks were felt throughout the eastern part of the United States on Aug. 31, 1886. These disturbances had the most damaging effect at Charleston, S. C., where 41 persons were killed and more than \$5,000,000 worth of property was destroyed.

On the islands of Zante and Stromboll, near Greece, there were great loss of life on April 17, 1893, by seismic shocks which destroyed many small

shocks which destroyed many small towns and \$1.000.000 worth of property. Later in the same year many Hves were lost, and Meshed and Kuchan, in Persia, were destroyed, as the result of etharquake shocks. In southern Eu-rope, along the Riviera, on Feb. 23, 1887, there were shocks of such sever-ity that 2,000 persons lost their lives by being maimed by falling buildings. More than 600 were killed in the Prov-ince of Granada, Spain, on Feb. 28, 1885. On Dec. 27, 1884, 900 persons were

1885. On Dec. 27, 1884, 900 persons were killed by shocks around Alhama and Granada. Two days before that 266 persons had been killed by shocks at Andalusia, Malaga. The shocks were felt as far as Madrid. A violent shock on the Island of Khism, near the mouth of the Persian guif, destroyed 12 villages, more than 200 persons be-ing killed. ing killed

ing killed. On April 22, 1884, the entire eastern section of England was shaken by shocks that resulted in a number of deaths and considerable damage to property. Anatolia, on the coast of property. Asta Mir Asta Minor, suffered an upheaval on Oct. 16, 1853, that cost 100 lives and

July 28 of the same year Casamic clola and several villages in the Island of Ischia were almost entirely de-stroyed. More than 1,990 persons were

stroyed. More than 1,990 persons were killed outright. The town of Scio and a number of villages surrounding it, were rent to atoms by an earthquaks that occurred on April 3, 1881. Cua, in Venezuela, was destroyed April 14, 1878, 300 persons being killed and \$500,000 worth of property laid in ruins. An earthquake and tidal wave near Mallao destroyed several towns and considerable shipping, though not many lives were lost, in the early part of May, 1877. The year previous tho entire Austrian empire was shaken by entire Austrian empire was shaken by shocks. Shocks that began on May 13, 1875, and lasted for several days, de-molished San Jose de Cucuta and oth-er towns near Santander, on the boun-dary of Colombia. It is recorded that more than 14,000 lives were lost.

When Antigua, in Guatemala, and a number of nearby villages were de-stroyed on Sept. 2, 1874, the loss of life was so great that no accurate estimate of the casualties was ever made. Nor was there anything like a probable estimate of the number of lives lost a year later when Kara Hissa and other places in Asia Minor were upset.

In 1868 the cities of Arequiqua, Iqui-In 1868 the cities of Arequiqua, iqui-que, Tacna, Chincha and dozens of small villages were obliterated from the map. Towns in Ecuador, as welt as those mentioned in Peru, were turned topsy turvy. More than 25,000 persons were killed, 30,000 were ren-dered homeless and the damage to property amounted to at least \$300,-000,000.

At Mitylene, in 1867, 1,000 persons were killed, and 400 lives were lost in Djocja, Java, in that same year. Mendoza, in South America, was destroyed on March 20, 1860, and 7,000 persons ere killed.

At Erzeroroum, Asia Minor, thou-sands perished from earthquake conse-quences between April and August, 1859, two months after 5,000 persons met death and much property was destroy-

ed. Calabria was visited by an earth-guake on Dec. 15, 1857; Montemurro and neighboring towns were destroyed, with a loss of life estimated at 10,000. In 75 years, from 1783 to 3857, the king-dom of Naples lost 110,000 inhabitants by carbonakas by earthquakes.

It is recorded that from 524 B. C. to 1856, A. D., there were numerous earthquakes, with from 50 to 3,000. casualties numbering
