JUSTICE DURAND AGAIN.

Petition for Writ of Prohibition Filed Against Him.

P. C. Barrett has filed a petition in the district court for a writ of prohibi-tion against Justice of the Peace Charles F. Durand of Murray to prevent the defendant from taking any further action in a case in his court in which I. H. Cook was plaintiff and Bar-rett was defendant. The action was brought to recover on a promissor note given by Barrett to secure the first payment on a life insurance policy which he claims he never received. He also alleges that the note is outlawed and hence Durand has no jurisdiction in the matter. Durand has rendered judgment against him, however, and has issued a writ of garnishment tying up Barrett's wages. It is now asked that he be prohibited from any further action in the case.

COURT NOTES.

The supreme court has dismissed the appeal in the case of Pauline Griffin, administratrix of the estate of H. J. Griffin, deceased, vs. the Southern Pa-cific company, appellant. Plaintiff was given damages in the lower court for \$8,000 for the death of her husband, who was killed by one of defendant's trains on Dec. 1, 1903. The company then appealed to the supreme court but the appeal is now dismissed.

Suit has been filed in the district court by John McGary against the Utah Consolidated Mining company to recover damages in the sum of \$5,000 for personal injuries received while employed by defendant. It is alleged that the head of a sledge hammer flew off the handle and struck him in the leg, inflicting injuries which laid him up for four weeks and which he believes will be permanent.

WRECK ON RIO GRANDE.

Three Employes Killed and One Badly

Injured Tuesday Morning. The wreck on the Rio Grande near Mounds, Carbon county, Tuseday morning, has been cleared up and trains are now running as usual. Three employes of the railroad company were killed and one injured.
