

## EVERY FOREIGN BULLET KILLS.

Legationnaires Defending Themselves With the Utmost Care.

## ARE SHORT OF AMMUNITION

None for Rapid-Fire Guns—Use Rifles Only When Close Pressed—Chinese Quarrel Among Themselves.

The Foo, July 26, via Shanghai, Aug. 2.—Copyright, 1900, the Associated Press.—The latest reports from Peking were brought by disaffected officers of the Chinese army. They are considered reliable. The officers left Peking on July 15. They say anarchy had reigned in Peking for weeks, and the streets ran blood, the Chinese fighting among themselves. Jung Lu, commander-in-chief of the Chinese forces, and Prince Ching, espoused the cause of the foreigners, and endeavored to the part of the army loyal to them, to expel the Boxers. Later, with the majority of the imperial troops, under anti-foreign leaders, Prince Tuan and General Tung Fuh Shan, were victorious and Jung Lu and Prince Ching, with their followers, were prisoners in their Yamen. The reports of these reports left Peking.

Prince Tuan and General Tung Fuh Shan appear to control the government, according to the officers, and issued edicts printed in the Gazette, exhorting the Chinese to kill all foreigners and native Christians. One officer says that there are sixteen thousand troops in Peking, including Tung's army, and eight thousand more at Yang-Tsun. The soldiers hold all the streets within a radius of the legations. The foreign consuls, when the officers left Peking, had burned and abandoned the Chienmen Gate. Their ammunition supply was falling and their quick firing guns had been silenced for some days before July 15, and they were using their rifles only when hard pressed. The officers said that every foreign bullet kills a Chinaman. The reports state that the American and English troops defeated General Ma, in a night battle on July 10.

The reports from Chinese sources are to the effect that the legationnaires are being killed. Chinamen caught a messenger who was trying to leave the legations on July 10, with the following message:

"To any foreign commander:

"Make all haste if you intend to save us. We can hold out but a few days!"

## Irishman Raises a Racket.

London, Aug. 3.—Once more Dr. Charles Tanner, nationalist member for the middle division of Cork, has been suspended from his seat in the House of Commons. The suspension was only for one night. It was accompanied by some that would have done credit to the most disorderly legislature in the world.

After opposing a vote in supply, Dr. Tanner was appointed a teller. Subsequently to the division the chairman announced that Dr. Tanner had grossly insulted him on account of the suspension, and that in consequence he would suspend him for the remainder of the sitting.

Deriding wildly, Dr. Tanner declared the chairman was the house and the whole English nation. Amid a deafening uproar he declared that the chairman was "merely one of the premier's minions." Then he exclaimed: "I defy the whole lot of you. I throw that in your teeth. As an Irishman I leave the house with greater pleasure than I ever entered it."

Then, while still members rose in their seats and tried to drown his utterances, Dr. Tanner still yelled defiance and went out.

## SIGNED WHEN DYING.

Dramatic Scene in Choosing Between Two Wills.

Chicago, Ill., Aug. 3.—Nathan J. Brown, one of the earliest business men of Chicago, and a pioneer lumberman, canal builder, quarryman, and land speculator, died at the age of 88 years, at the old Brown homestead in Le Mont, Mont. He was born in Windsor, Vermont, in 1812.

Before his death, he had ordered two will papers prepared, and he declared that to which to sign was a dramatic feature of the aged testator's last days. The property is realty in Le Mont, Mont. 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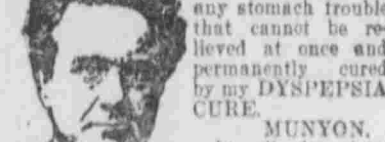

General Wilson is to report for service to Major General Chaffee at Tien Tsin. He expects to receive orders from Washington before his departure.

New York, Aug. 2.—Captain John McIntosh, senior commander of the Ward Line fleet, died this morning at his home in Jersey City. He was in his sixty-third year.

## Sailed Under a False Name.

New York, Aug. 3.—Several Italians in Paterson claim that they thought that the Anton Leininger, who was arrested at New York as being an accomplice of Bresci's was the man who sailed for Italy from Paterson. Bresci, on July 1st, under the name of Banchi.

"We called him Gribson," said one man, "and that was the name Bresci knew him by, but it was only a nick name. His real name was Lerner, and he was known to be a friend of Bresci."

An inspection of the books of the Waldman Dyeing company showed that a Lerner had been employed there at one time. He had been discharged, however, two years ago.

## Searching for a Lost Son.

St. Louis, Mo., Aug. 3.—Christopher and Margaret O'Neil, traveling with their five children in search of an eighteen year old son, Charles, who disappeared from his home in Pittsburgh, Pa., more than a year ago, are stopping here for a few days. The members of the family, who are traveling overland in two wagons, have covered 61 miles since they left their home in Pittsburgh last April. Mrs. O'Neil says their journey will not end until their son is found.

For more than a year after their son disappeared his parents heard not one word from him. Last February they heard that he had been in Fort Madison, Iowa, in March of the previous year. All attempts to locate him by letter proved futile and he was determined to break up the Pittsburgh home and institute a thorough search for the missing member of the family. Though no trace has been discovered none of the O'Neil family has lost hope and they expect to find him in the end their quest will be successful.

## More Boers Surrender.

Capetown, Aug. 3.—Liebberg's command attacked General Smith's force, near Port Elizabeth, but was easily repulsed. General Jan Hamilton has gone to Rustenburg to bring away Baden-Powell's garrison.

Seven hundred and fifty additional Boers have surrendered to Gen. Hunter.

## Great Forest Fires.

Los Angeles, Cal., Aug. 3.—Great forest fires continue to burn in the Sierra Madre mountains. A report from Camp Stuart states that although the fire does not threaten the camp as much as it did a week ago, there still remains much work for the fire fighters to do. Unless the flames are soon checked a large area of the San Gabriel forest reserve, in addition to the 15 or 20 square miles already devastated, will be laid waste.

Martin's camp on Mount Washington, has been cut off from communication with this city. The chief danger point at present is around Elizabeth Peak, back of Monrovia. If the fire has got well down into West fork, as now seems probable, there is no telling where it will stop.
