NO MORE EPIDEMICS.

Society of Science Give Bay's Burial Banquet.

BRIENTON BAYS KILL BACTERIA.

Yellow, Diphtheria, Cholera and Typhoid Fever Yield to the New Remedy.

Utah, April 13.—Prof. W. H. Bay and Horn Wigham, the scientist and bacteriologist of this city, claim to have practically passed within the last week that epidemics will be impossible in the future. They claim that typhoid fever is the most to be feared, that cholera, and other diseases, gonorrhea and typhoid are as good in the new remedy, the Remedy of 1891. The various germs were grown in the culture in their microscopes. Thus three new diseases—typhoid, cholera and typhoid—have been thrown into the interest. The applicable date is now.
