MARKS WINS OUT,

MARKS WINS OUT, H. B. 177, by Marks, appropriating \$10,000 annually for a capitol building fund, came up for consideration any passed. The bill was strongly opposed by Mr. Kinney, who argued that if was a needless provision at this time. JOSEPH SUPPRESSED.

JOSEPH SUPPRESSED. The evening session developed a spir-ited tilt between Joseph and Speaker Pro Tem, Wilson. The latter took the chair for the purpose of demonstrating to his colleagues how the obstreperous "gentleman from Sait Lake" should be handled. This he did by ruling him out of order and refusing to recognize him when anyone else desired the floor. Jo-seph stood this until patience had ceased to be a virtue, when he raised the point that another member could only occupy the chair in the absence of the regular speaker. His point was declared not well taken. PRONOUNCED DEAD

H. B. 178, providing that deposits of state money be made in all banks in proportion to the security offered and that the state receive on said funds not less thin 3 per cont interest per an-sum, was discussed vigorously on a motion by Joseph to strike out the en-acting clause. After much had been said on both sides of the question, the motion prevailed and the bill was pro-nounced dead.

B. 133, providing for an ad valorem tax of 5 mills on all property in the state, for the purpose of raising \$750,000 for school purposes, went through after an effort to postpone consideration. S. B. 105, prescribing the duties of the county auditor, was placed at the foot of the calendar, after a hair-breadth cscupe from sudden death.
